Enrollment in **Public Schools** Here Up 925

Farmington School officials over the past several years have been predicting school en-rollment increases with a very good degree of accuracy but this year really did themselves

When the official fourth Ff-day school year enrollment count was made last Friday if was found that there were a to-tal of 12,661 students enrolled in the Farmington public school system. This is just one student for the fourth Friday of ¹⁶4, which was made by the school district's administrators in the late, fall of last year. Supt. 'G. W. Harrison keps insting that he has no crystal ball in his office but one can't help but wonder.
