OLS Rebounds in 2nd Half To Down St. Fredrick's, 25-7

The Our Lady of Sorrows' Lancers were trailing St. Fredrick's 7-6 at the half but the second half told a different story. The Lancers scored 4 times in the second half as their defense kept St. Fredrick's scoreless to win their second game of the year, 25-7.

MYLES KEARNEY was 13 yards in the second half as he dove one yard for the touchdown. The extra point failed but the Lancers were ahead 13-7.

After receiving the ball on the kick-off, St. Fredrick's was forced to punt again from their end zone. Myles Kearney caught the punt and gained 40 yards for a touchdown. But a much-disputed clipping penalty nullified the TD. The Lancers still had possession of the ball but back on St. Fredrick's 40 yard line. From the 40 the Lancers drove hard and Myles Kearney scampered 12 yards to pay dirt. The try for the extra point failed and the Lancers led 18-7.

THE DEFENSE for Sorrows was very outstanding as St. Fredrick's couldn't move the ball.

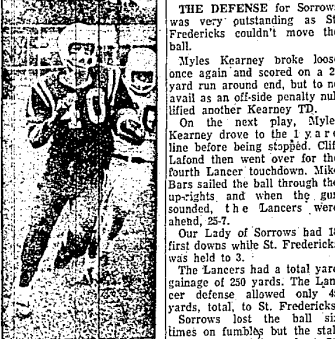
Myles Kearney broke loose once again and scored on a 22 yard run around end, but to no avail as an offside penalty nullified another Kearney TD.

On the next play, Myles Kearney drove to the 1 yard line before being stopped. Cliff Bars sailed the ball through the up-lights and when the gun sounded, the Lancers were ahead, 25-7.

Our Lady of Sorrows had 19 first downs while St. Fredrick's had 10.

The Lancers had a total yardage of 250 yards. The Lancer defense allowed only 45 yards, total, to St. Fredrick's. Sorrows lost the ball six times on fumbles but the stalwart Lancer defense kept St. Fredrick's in check.

This Sunday Our Lady of Sorrows plays at St. Michael's with the starting time being at 2:30.

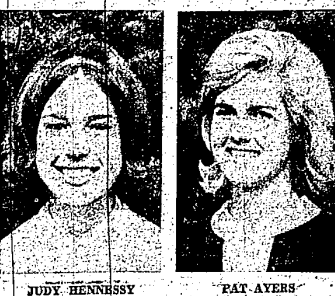

Undefeated Farmington Faces Walled Lake in Grid Showdown

The Farmington High School football team heads into its pivotal Inter-Lakes Conference game with defending league champions Walled Lake tomorrow riding on the crest of a 3-0 record, with their latest gridiron triumph a 3-0 rout of Pontiac Northern.

The Falcon victory over the Huskies of Pontiac Northern last Friday afternoon, on the Farmington gridiron may prove to be a costly one, however, since an injury to Roy Leach may leave a gaping hole in the Blue and White offense.

LEACH CARRIED the ball 11 times for the Falcons, averaging about four yards per carry before going out with a twisted left ankle with just four minutes gone in the second period of play and Farmington holding onto a slim 6-0 lead. Those six points came on Leach's third crack at the line after halfback Bruce Charles had returned the opening kick-off 77 yards to the Pontiac Northern eight yard line.

Farmington put together its next scoring drive with slightly more than five minutes left in the half. The Falcons consumed about 25 seconds of the clock at quarterback Mike Wilson used ten plays to travel the 33 yards and capped the drive by going over from the one-yard line.

After the game, Leach covered a Pontiac Northern fullback to start the drive.

END TOM MITCHELL caught a pass from Wilson to move the ball to the Pontiac Northern 30 yard line and three plays later, halfback Dick Johnston snatched another pass from Wilson to move the ball down to the one yard line.

Wayne Johnston's kick was good and made the score at intermission, 13-0, in favor of Farmington.

MIKE PERRY intercepted a Pontiac Northern pass to stall a Husky drive at the FHS 44 yard line in the third quarter. Charles dashed to the Husky 30 yard line on the longest run of the drive and a Wilson-to-Mitchell aerial which covered the ball to the Pontiac Northern three, carried the ball from the three-yard line on third down to put the Falcons comfortably out in front, 18-0.

After an exchange of punts, Farmington's Dick Johnston recovered a Husky fumble on the Pontiac Northern five yard line, setting up the first two touchdowns by fullback Dick Isbell, the replacement for Leach.

WAYNE JOHNSTON'S kick was good and the Falcons commanded a 26-0 lead going into the final nine minutes of play.

Another Husky fumble gave Farmington the ball at the Pontiac Northern 36 yard line and six plays later Isbell cracked over from a yard out to cap the scoring. Johnston's try for the extra point sailed through the uprights to give the Falcons a 33-0 bulge.

The final five minutes of play saw the Huskies make their deepest penetration of the day

as they reached the Farmington 17 yard line before their drive stalled and the Falcons again gained control. Pontiac Northern was able to move into Falcon territory on only three occasions in the game and, Farmington held a wide margin in game statistics.

FALCON COACH Jack Hayes used a starting line up offensively of Dick Johnston and Bruce Charles at the halfback spots, Roy Leach at fullback, Ron Cleveland at quarterback, Mike Perry and Mike Freeman at the guard positions, Rick Sessary and Keith Collins at the tackle spots, Bill Crane at center and Tom Mitchell and Terry Nielsen at the end positions.

Tomorrow's game with Walled Lake is the Homecoming game for the Falcons and is due to get under way on the Farmington gridiron at 3:30 p.m. Walled Lake boasts a 2-1 record and laid low a good Waterford team, 30-0, last Friday to open their league campaign.

Farmington's drive to a state cross country title was interrupted last Saturday, October 3, at the Oakland County Meet, when the Harriers received an unexpected setback.

Shooting for first place honors, and figuring on nothing less than second, the Falcons ended up settling for fifth place in the ten-team meet.

The order of finish among the Farmington runners was a little different than usual. Bruce Anderson led the team by taking 11th place on a time of 11:03. Ron Morgan followed at 18th place, only five seconds behind Anderson.

Farmington's regular first runner, Joe Watson, was hampered by a heavy chest cold, and came in 28th at 11:28. Gary Ichulze and Chip Terry captured the last scoring position by placing 38th and 43th, respectively.

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Raider Gridders Edge Detroit Northern, 12-6

North Farmington rolled to its third victory in as many starts by downing Detroit Northern High School, 12-6. The Raiders final warm-up was the Raiders final warm-up before traveling to Groves Saturday night to open the North-west Suburban League campaign.

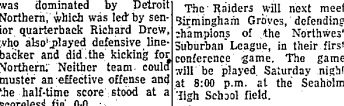
The first half of the game was dominated by Detroit Northern, which was led by senior quarterback Richard Drew who also played defensive line-backer and did the kicking for Northern. Neither team could muster an effective offense and the half-time score stood at a scoreless tie, 0-0.

In the third quarter North Farmington drew first blood as senior fullback Craig Weynski carried the ball into the end zone for the touchdown. Weynski was cited by Coach Ron Tolland as the outstanding offensive player of the game as he totaled 44 yards in 7 attempts to average 6.3 yards per carry. Northern also tallied in the third quarter to even the score, 6-6.

In the final quarter halfback Bob Linderman carried the ball back and broke away for a 39 yard run into Northern territory. Several plays later fullback Craig Weynski dove into the end zone for his second score of the afternoon. It was the last touchdown of the game and the final score read 12-6 — Detroit Northern, 6.

In the statistics column Northern rolled up 15 first downs to North Farmington's 7. On the ground Northern totaled 162 yards in 50 carries while Farmington's total was 107 yards in 37 carries. Northern completely only 3 of 17 passes for 35 yards. North Farmington quarterback Bill Oldershaw had 11 of 19 passes for a 44 percent completion percentage and 38 yards. In total offense Detroit Northern picked up 228 yards to NF's 188.

North Farmington also intercepted 3 Northern passes while the Detroit squad picked off
