Mrs. Len Blouin of Wayne will be co-hostess for the evening.



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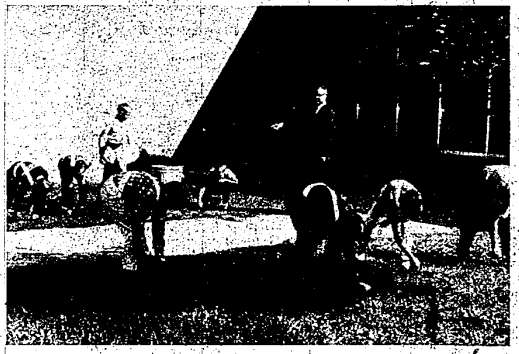
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628 School Children Join Klean-Up Kenbrook Campaign

Children's Drama Classes Being Planned

A meeting will be held at the Farmington Players' Club at 12, Twelve Mile Rd. at Power, on Thursday, October 15, at 3:30 p.m., to explore the need for a dramatics classes here for children and young people. If sufficient interest is shown, classes will be scheduled to begin soon afterwards.

Mrs. George Nahstol will teach the classes on a fee basis and the Farmington Players will then produce the play for audiences of children and young people. Classic children's stories in dramatic form will be selected, with a cast of characters to fit the size of the class. When the play has been sufficiently rehearsed and the young actors developed to polished performance, the play will then be scheduled for public performance. The classes will thus serve two very vital needs in the community to give children and young people the chance to actually perform on the stage for an audience; and to expose children and young people of the community to the theater designed for their level of interest.

Mrs. Nahstol stated that there has been a great deal of interest for several years, on the Farmington Players and on her personally, to offer classes in dramatics for children.

The meeting on October 15 is planned primarily so that mothers of children from ten years of age through high school, can get acquainted with the teaching of children and young people which she will approach this project; and then decide whether or not to enroll their children.

Tentative plans call for the first performance of the play during the Christmas holidays and then for several Saturdays thereafter. Two classes would work on the same play so that there would be a double cast to perform interchangeably in case of illness or absence of a given performer.

Mrs. Nahstol has a B.A. degree in Education and 24 years of experience in amateur theater in every phase but primarily in acting, directing and costumeing. She is well-known twelve years ago of the Farmington Players. She has performed many notable roles for Farmington and also Dearborn Players' Guild, of which she was a member for 15 years.

The most memorable of the many plays she has directed for Farmington are "The Hearty Heart" in 1950 and "Rain" produced last season.

Farmington Players look forward to achieving another facet of their objective of presenting good live theater in the community.
