Stressing the small-group approach, boys and girls will be placed in groups of eight to ten in number with a select counselor. Individual growth is expected through the development of human relation skills and creative craft skills. Part of the program will include archery, sports, handicrafts, trips, etc. Of primary importance will be the club-type experience in democratic procedures.

Aiding this process will be King Cotton and Sue Kirchner, both students in the Farmington schools. Directing the total program will be Helen Cortright who acted as Day Camp Counselor this past summer. Miss Cortright is a teacher in Highland and has many years of "Y" experience to draw on.
