
Get Easement From Glenmuir

An easement to permit the extension of Glenmuir Drive down into the new Canterbury Subdivision now under development to the east of the North Farmington High School has been obtained, Trustee Herb Neal informed his fellow Board of Education members at their regular meeting Monday night.

Neal indicated that he and board President Leland Cliff had negotiated with the owner of the property for the easement at a price of \$200. The expenditure was approved.

It was pointed out during discussion that this was an important easement, since it would permit students going to either North Farmington High or the Board School living to the north to get to school without having to cross any major roadways.

Vagnozzi Blasts Supervisor on Health Issue

Aldo Vagnozzi, Democratic candidate for Farmington Township Supervisor, promised to a party rally last week that if elected he would immediately move to correct the health hazards which exist in parts of the township because of inadequate septic tank facilities.

He said an immediate danger of an outbreak of hepatitis, a highly contagious liver disease, exists because raw sewage is being pumped into road ditches near children play.

Vagnozzi made a personal inspection of one such area in the township a few miles north of Farmington. He said he was shocked to find the situation.

"This resident came to me after futile attempts to get the township supervisor interested in solving the problem," Vagnozzi reported.

"I immediately contacted the county health department and asked them to check into the complaint. A county health officer told me that the sewage could not be tested."

"HE ALSO told me that the chemicals needed to neutralize the dangers posed by the raw sewage would have to be of such a strength as to be dangerous to the children."

"I was also told that the present practice of bringing the sewage tank overflow out into the ditches was illegal but that nothing could be done because removal of the tanks would only mean that the sewage would flow in the back yards."

"I was further told that only if there is an outbreak of hepatitis can the county health department try to do something about the situation."

Vagnozzi asked the present township supervisor to explain why he did nothing to correct this situation, especially since the sewer lines run so close to the area.

"HERE AGAIN is an example of the Farmington township community suffering because of the drift, drag and delay tactics of the present supervisor," Vagnozzi charged.

"Vagnozzi reminded his audience that up until a few years ago, Farmington township had a local health officer who kept on top of these hazardous situations. 'The present supervisor eliminated the local health officer,'" Vagnozzi declared.

"I elected, I would move to restore the local health officer and to correct the dangerous health hazards that presently exist. It is ironic that in an area when we can solve the problem of orbiting into outer space that we cannot solve the problem of what to do with our sewage."

Curt Hall Says Health Charges Are Unfounded

"My Democrat opponent's weekly blasts at the administration get more and more ridiculous," said Supervisor Curt Hall in response to the charge by his opponent of laxity in health enforcement.

"Now he is criticizing us because we replaced a pediatrician with no training as a sanitarian, who gave us an afternoon a week when he was not busy with all of the full time facilities of the Oakland County Health Department, including 4 doctors, 8 trained sanitarians and a complete laboratory with adequate lab and other facilities," said Mr. Hall, "How silly can he get?"

"We now have the best health service we have ever had," said Hall, "and we are in our township every day and the complete facilities of the Department are at our service, continued by the Supervisor."

MR. HALL pointed out that the only permanent solution to sewage disposal problems are adequate public sewers. "In our five and one-half years, we have 20 miles of trunk sewers built or under construction, and 10 miles of subdivision lateral sewers. Additional miles of sewer are in the planning and public hearing stage, including sewers for the Nine Mile and Middlebelt areas," said Mr. Hall. "We don't have to apologize to any one for our record and we intend to keep at the job until sanitary sewers are available throughout the township."

"No new subdivisions are being approved without sewers," continued Hall, "but we will continue to have problems in existing areas until sewers can be provided. Experience has shown that soil conditions in many areas of the township will not permit adequate septic tank installations."

"WE HAVE tightened our requirements for new installations but are still faced with problems in existing homes."

"Our health officer makes recommendations and we enforce them. The only step which we have not taken, and which is to force people to move out of their homes, homes that may represent their life savings. I wonder if this is my opponent's solution?" Mr. Hall concluded.

Jaycee Auxiliary to Open Babysitting Clinic Oct. 21

Again this year their opening session will be presented by Mrs. Ralph Plichta, a registered nurse, along with the assistance of her co-chairman Mrs. Ralph Plichta, wife of the present Jaycee President. They will be presenting the "First Aid" program, covering what to do if an accident should happen.

"CHILD CARE" with a real, live baby will be presented in the second session by Mrs. Robert Witt of Farmington and Mrs. Frank Caplan, registered nurse of Farmington. They will discuss the feeding, dressing and handling of children of various ages.

Mrs. Scott Crisler of Farmington will handle "Safety in the Home With Children." Mrs. Crisler will deliver an informative message on precautions, and reactions in an emergency. A police officer will assist in this session.

The fourth session will be a "Panel Discussion" with Mrs. Tom Oliver of Farmington as chairman. The discussion will consist of what the parent, child, and sitter can and should expect.

DR. EDWIN BLUMBERG, local physician, will again demonstrate emergency measures that every babysitter should know regarding "Artificial Respiration." This knowledge of course could be beneficial to a sitter at any time.

A "Written Examination" will be given, corrected and returned to the students during the sixth and final session. The Chairman Mrs. Charles Boston of Farmington.

these sessions are very well qualified and will provide everyone attending with interesting, useful information geared to prepare a student for the pleasures and responsibilities of being substitute parents.

Rocket Grid Teams Play at NFHS Sunday

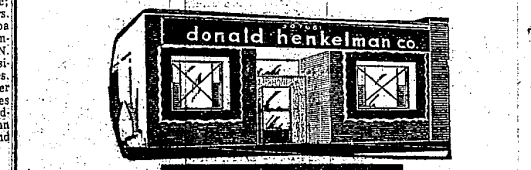
The Farmington Junior Football Association will play this Sunday, October 18, at North Farmington High School's gridiron.
