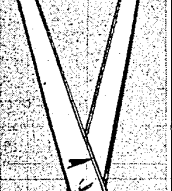
First Aid Course To Open November 4

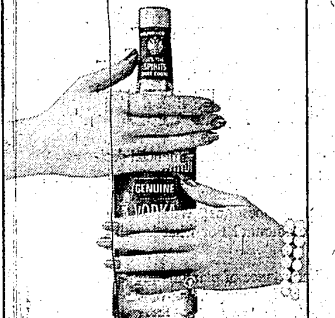

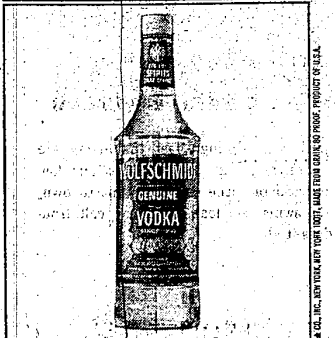
