They played on fairly even terms until the middle of the fourth period. Here, on the only play in a superb Rocket defense the Spartans mounted an offensive, capped by a 35 yard pass play for the TD. The extra point was ahead. A last change drive by the Rockets, looked like it might still pull it out of the fire.

The Clarkston Trojans traveled to Bloomfield Hills tomorrow afternoon to do battle on the gridiron in quest of the second victory of the 1964 campaign.

The Trojan eleven were dealt a 12-0 setback by league rival Clarkston last Friday in an evenly matched game. Coach Ralph Tumby's squad has a lone victory over winless Brighton to sparkle its 1-4 overall season mark.

AGAINST CLARKSTON, Clarkston rolled to six first downs. Three first downs came by way of their aerial game which had only six out of 17 attempts make good with three falling into enemy hands.

The Trojans racked up 59 yards rushing and 43 passing for a total offense of 104 yards. Clarkston's defense held the Trojans to a 24-yard pass play and the final marker came after a drive of 50 yards. The Clarkston eleven had lost four games in five tries prior to taking the decision from Clarkston.

## Raiders Down Oak Park, 27-6 To Remain in Unbeaten Ranks

The North Farmington Raiders extended their undefeated streak to five games as they rolled to a decisive 27-6 victory over the Oak Park Redskins.

The Raiders once again relied on a strong second half as they totaled 20 points in the final two quarters to dump previously unbeaten, unscored upon Oak Park.

It was North Farmington's second Northwest Suburban League triumph of the 1964 season and moved the Raiders into a two-way tie for first place with unbeaten Livonia Franklin. Oak Park dropped to second place with one win and one loss in league play.

Both North Farmington and Oak Park carried perfect 4-0 records into the game but Oak Park held the distinction of allowing their opponents to cross their goal line. This streak ended early in the second quarter as Raiders quarterback Bob Urbanish hit end John McDonald in a 44 yard pass play for a North Farmington touchdown. Tom Trausch kicked the extra point to provide NF with a 6-0 half time edge.

With only several minutes gone in the third quarter, halfback Ed Linderman skirting the end for an 11 yard scoring romp raised the score to 13-0.

**Falcon Eleven Edged By East Detroit 19-13**

Wayne Johnston's kick for the extra point was good and the score was all even, 13-13.

BRUCE CHARLES recovered an East Detroit fumble on their 35 yard line. Farmington then drove to the 5, but a fumble halted the drive and Farmington.

The first half of the fourth quarter saw the ball change hands five times and both teams had fumbles. Farmington recovered a fumble on East Detroit's 17 yard line and this seemed to be the break that Farmington had

to raise the score, 13-0. Oak Trausch then kicked the pat with only four seconds remaining in the game to complete the scoring, with the final score NF-27 Oak Park-6.

Thus far in conference play this season North Farmington has amassed 65 points in two games, while allowing only two points to their two opponents. An even more outstanding feature is that 53 of the points have been scored in the second halves only, with 38 points against Groves and 20 against Oak Park. In the first five games the Raiders are averaging 20.6 points per game while allowing opponents an average of only 4.8 points per game.

North Farmington will now travel to Redford Thurston Saturday, Oct. 24, in an attempt at its third consecutive conference victory.

Not to be outdone, North Farmington drove to the Oak Park 30 yard line after a 23 yard run back of an interception by senior guard and linebacker, Mike Wilson. Halfback Gerald Bliss, a 140-pound senior, then carried the ball three consecutive times to set up his own six yard scoring plunge. Tom

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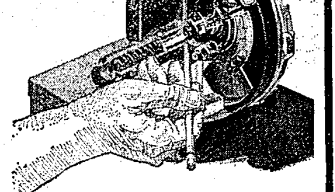
## Mullin Stars at Albion College

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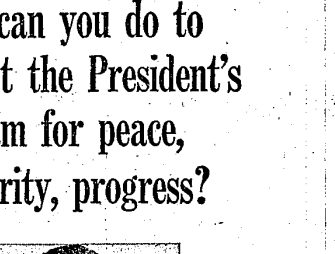
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## Lancer Gridders Beaten By St. Mary's Eleven, 7-6

Farmington took over at the start of the second quarter deep in their own territory.

BRUCE CHARLES carried the ball to the FHS 39 for a first down. A few plays later, Mike Wilson dropped back and offered a pass to end Terry Nielsen who scampered the rest of the way to pay-dirt. The touchdown play in all covered 61 yards. The kick for the extra point was wide but the Falcons led 6-0 with 8 minutes left in the half.

East Detroit's drive was halted as Falcon halfback Carl Misch intercepted a pass. Mike Wilson then attempted to lead his team to score again but he was thrown for a 21-yard loss and the Falcons had to give up the ball.

With one minute left in the half, East Detroit's Bruce Gumbing hit Chuck Kirby for a 60-yard touchdown play. Their try for extra point was blocked and the score stood at 13-6 at the half.

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
