

# Community College Location Takes Over Pontiac Nike Site

The first of three proposed campus sites for the Oakland County Community College has been selected at the northeast corner of 1-75 and M-59, just east of Pontiac, the community college board of trustees announced last week.

The 237-acre parcel is currently under lease to the U.S. Army as a Nike site until the end of 1964, and has 30,000 square feet of one-story masonry buildings — all constructed within the last nine years.

Board Chairman George Mosher announced the offer of the Community College to purchase the land for \$247,000 has been accepted by the National Bank of Detroit, trustees for the Fisher family.

Mosher said, "The college trustees have requested the transfer of the more than 31 million worth of buildings (complete with electrical, water and sewer service) from the Army to the Community College. The facility is no longer used by the Army, and it is our understanding that this transfer could be accomplished within the next few weeks."

Dr. John E. Tirrell, college president, said the building (A map showing the location of the first campus site appears below on this page.)

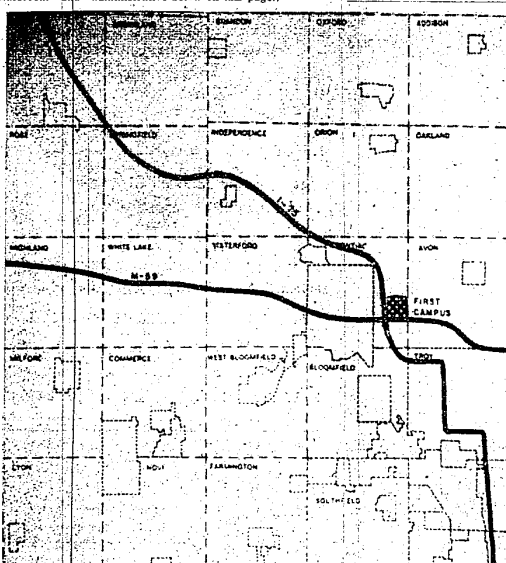
"By September 1965, we could handle 800 to 1,000 full-time students in the converted buildings," Dr. Tirrell said. "It is the intention of the college board to operate all facilities from 8 a.m. to 10 p.m. daily, but only detailed study will serve the exact enrollment to be served on the first campus," he said.

THE COLLEGE board has placed accessibility to the populated centers of the district at the top of its priorities in site selection, because nearly all prospective students will be living home.

With the interchange currently under construction at 1-75 and M-59, the newly acquired site is within 30 minutes travel time of the entire eastern and northern section of Oakland County.

The college trustees have other sites under consideration, for three campus locations were recommended in earlier studies to serve the anticipated 12,000 to 14,000 student enrollment by 1970.

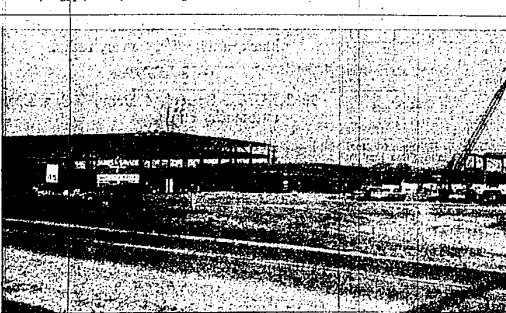

#### Twp. Supervisor Hall Charges Opponents With Mud-Slinging
