will be prepared here and distributed to other grade schools in the area. Plans were revised to afford a better flow of traffic in the office and cart area. A call-up door will open onto the loading dock which will be at floor level with a depressed driveway for the delivery truck.

The central kitchen was planned for future expansion if needed for instructional purposes.

ANOTHER ITEM approved for the new school was the selection of a gas heating system. The vote was four to two (Vernon Fisher absent) for gas over oil.

It was decided to take bids on the construction of the school on November 19, or November 23, whichever date the architect deems best.

The new school, to be located at Tuck Road between Middlebelt and Orchard Lake Roads, will be needed by the beginning of school in the fall of 1965, and should be put under construction as soon as possible to assure its completion by then; Supl. G. V. Harrison stated.

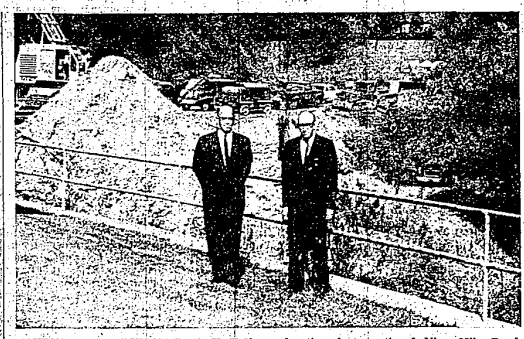

## Debate Issues at Kiwanis Club Meeting

In the township was cited by Hall as another major accomplishment of his administration. Plans are being signed up to locate in the park and water and sewer facilities which will be completed into the park by January or February will make it possible to get many more in the park and water and sewer industries, the supervisor said. He emphasized the need for this type of industrial development to stabilize the township's declining tax base.

HALL ALSO pointed out that the new Township Hall putting all township departments under one roof was still another accomplishment of his administration.

The supervisor's position on re-zoning matters was that each rezoning request must be considered on the basis of its own merit.

Trustee candidate Kahn was extremely critical of the township zoning board in his remarks at the meeting. He stated that he felt far too much improper re-zoning was being done to the detriment of single family homeowners in the community.

Homeowners and their representatives are not being given fair treatment before the zoning board or township board in their efforts to protect their property rights and their home and property values, Kahn charged. He said that his main reason for deciding to run for trustee was because he felt that something must be done to correct the situation that prevails where citizens are being given little opportunity to have their say with regard to township government matters.

INCUMBENT Trustee Oppenheimer concentrated his comments on charges by Democratic candidates that the administration is doing little to correct safety problems in the township.

He emphasized the fact that the township administration has no direct jurisdiction over speed limits, where stop lights go or like matters. Oppenheimer was quick to add, however, that the present administration has worked hard for safety improvements and has been successful in getting speed limits lowered in seven major thoroughfares and new stop lights installed at five accident-critical intersections.

Traffic safety is primarily an individual responsibility of drivers and cannot be legislated by any administration, Oppenheimer commented. He cited the fact that the present administration had recently adopted an ordinance controlling ingress and egress onto major thoroughfares. Plans have also been completed to initiate an educational program on driver safety for the general citizenry in the very near future, he added.

Gluckstein charged that far too much authority was being left in the hands of the zoning board in Farmington Township and that the real responsibility for policies regarding zoning and re-zoning, development planning and all other township matters should be primarily the responsibility of the township board.

Gluckstein stated that he was definitely not opposed to residential development and more commercial development where needed but felt that much more serious consideration should be given to the adverse effects that zoning changes might have on single family landowners' property values and rights before zoning changes are made.

His implication was that the present administration has not shown enough concern for single family homeowners in this regard.

GLUCKSTEIN also emphasized that he felt citizens were being restricted from having their say on township matters and getting their wishes and desires considered by present township officials and their appointed board members.

Tom Duke, GOP incumbent trustee, emphasized the need for a balance of industrial, commercial and apartment development in the township along with single family home construction to provide a healthy community financially and one that citizens can afford and will want to make their homes in.

Treasurer Elsie Avery and her Democratic opponent, Eunice Petty, both refrained from making any charges against each other or the opposing political party.

Mrs. Avery reviewed for the group the tremendous growth and increase in work that has resulted in the treasurer's department during her administration. Emphasized by her was the fact that despite the heavy increase of work to be done in her department, only one part-time employee had been added to her staff to date.

MRS. PETTY outlined to the group her qualifications and her keen interest and knowledge in township affairs as a lifelong resident of the community. She stated that she felt there was a need for more automated equipment in the treasurer's department speed work in this department and keep employee costs down.

Mrs. Petty said that, if elected, she would consider seriously the possibility of setting up a plan whereby taxes could be paid in two installments rather than all in one payment.

James P. Lawson, Dem., and Byron B. Walters, Rep., candidates for justice of the peace, also refrained from attacking one another but rather confined their remarks to outlining their qualifications to serve in
