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FORMER JUSTICE of the Peace
Mrs. Eva Ross Reviews Her Term

Mrs. Eva E. (LeFevre) Ross, who served as Justice of the Peace in the community of Farmington from 1921 to 1928, is pictured above with Farmington attorney James P. Lawson, who is currently seeking election to the office in Farmington Township.

Mrs. Ross reviewed the responsibilities of the Justice Court in her term with the growing responsibilities of the office. When she first assumed the duties of Justice of the Peace, Farmington was a small rural village and Grand River Avenue was just a two-lane highway.

Mrs. Ross also remembers helping out Dr. Sam Holcomb on emergencies when the stock market delivered. She also occasionally played the organ when there was a funeral at under-18s, Ross Northrup's establishment.

Mrs. Ross served under Oakland County Prosecuting Attorney Floyd Blackledge Clyde U. Leonard, who was Mr. Blackledge's assistant prosecutor. She also recalls James Lynch, who was the then President of the Oakland County Bar Association.

Isaacs Bond was the Supervisor of Farmington Township. Mrs. Ross remembers when the citizens voted to incorporate as a city, and appointed John J. Schulte, Jr., as their first Municipal Judge. Judge Schulte began a reign of 35 years which culminated in his retirement in January of this year. He still makes his home in Farmington.

MRS. ROSS HAS watched the growing community come to require more services for its citizens over the years. She noted the greater needs of today in the areas of housing, highways, sewer and water facilities, schools and social facilities. She feels any community requires good leadership for expansion with progressive measures taken to insure a sound and well balanced growth.

Mrs. Ross would like to see a local committee appointed to study the problems of the community's senior citizens which she feels is more necessary today with a greater number of citizens within the ranks of the aged.
