Thomas Duke Answers Enterprise Editorial

Thomas A. Duke, Republican candidate for the office of Trustee on the Farmington Township Board, came into the Enterprise office this week "to comply with a statement in an editorial in last week's Enterprise," he said.

The statement was, "The Enterprise would also like to see the candidates start backing up their broad and sweeping charges and counter charges against each other with factual data."

Duke said that he has made two charges in this campaign both of them against Martin Gluckstein, Democratic candidate for Township Trustee. One charge was made at an open meeting held by the Kiwanis Club on Tuesday, October 20, 1964. Duke produced the newspaper and the statement read, "Gluckstein regarded it as more than a coincidence that all of the members of the auditing board were appointed for the time during Duke's incumbency on the Township Board, except Mills and Hannan, the only members who opposed his re-nominating request."

Duke had with him a copy of the Township Board Minutes of August 8, 1964, at which meeting he was listed as "present." At that meeting the following zoning board members were appointed: William, Gardhouse, Hannan, Offelt, Allen, Mills and Richardson. Offelt and Allen are no longer on the board, and Duke said that Williams and Lorian had been appointed since then.

Duke pointed out that all of the present seven zoning board members had been appointed during his incumbency, including Mills and Hannan.

"I am only doing what your Editorial asked," said Duke. "I made the charges, and now I have backed them up."

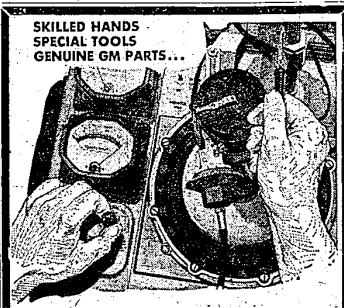

Plan Ceramic Workshop Here

Teachers of the Farmington Public Schools will have an opportunity to participate in a ceramic workshop as part of the systems in-service program on October 28-29. The workshop will be held at Flanders Elementary School from 3:30 to 5:15 p.m.

Presented by the American Art Clay Co. of Indianapolis, the purpose of the workshop is to provide practical experiences related to the teaching of pottery craft and to introduce new materials and methods. Teachers will participate in forming and decorating clay shapes, hand methods of pottery making, glazing, decorating and other ceramic techniques.

THE WORKSHOP will be conducted by Mr. William G. who has attended Butler University and received a Bachelor of Art Education degree from the John Herron Art School, Indianapolis. Following graduation he taught arts and crafts in high school, and worked in the advertising department of the American Art Clay Co. Graduate work in ceramics and metal enameling was taken at the Amaco Summer Workshops, conducted jointly by the American Art Clay Co. and the John Herron Art School.

Arrangements for the in-service ceramic workshop were made by Robert Benjamin, Elementary Art Consultant in cooperation with Minnie Ziebeck, Director of Elementary Education. Twenty-five elementary teachers have made reservations for participation, in addition to Farmington's seven elementary art consultants. Plans have been made for these teachers and consultants to conduct further clay workshops in each of the Farmington elementary schools in the near future.
