Dr. Martin has the following comments to make regarding his hospital's three year accreditation.

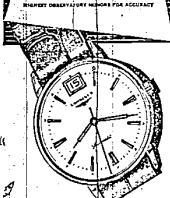

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Youth Groups In Farmington Help UNICEF

Junior and Senior High youth groups of the Methodist Church, Farmington, went "Trick or Treating" for UNICEF this past weekend. Because of the kind reception of neighbors in Briar Hill, Kendallwood and Westbrooke, about \$300 was collected.

What does this mean? What is UNICEF?

UNICEF STANDS for United Nations Children's Fund - it was created by the United Nations in 1946.

Of the billion or more children now growing up in the world, three out of four live in economically under-developed countries—poor countries where hunger, sickness and ignorance threaten the child's welfare at every turn.

UNICEF HELPS these children by helping countries draw up practical plans to meet their needs and by providing some of the key international assistance required to carry out these plans. It provides necessary supplies not available within the country, and aids in training of national staff to plan and operate these projects. They set up a network of permanent Health Services through which mothers and children can get expert advice and help. Large scale Disease Control campaigns in which prevention or mass treatment is possible receive UNICEF aid. These must be carried on continuously. No tritition projects, Family a and Child Welfare services, Educational and Vocational Training are other fields.

UNICEF is financed by voluntary contributions from governments and individuals, not through the United Nations budget. The number of governments contributing has steadily increased to 104. Private contributions, made by individuals and collected through campaigns such as "Trick or Treat" for UNICEF at Halloween time, are an important source of revenue.

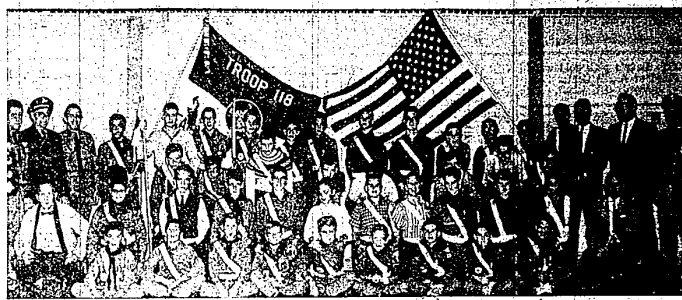

Obituary

DON J. NEDEAU
Don J. (David) Nedreau of 2928 Inster Road in Southfield, a former resident of Farmington for 43 years, died at a Veterans Hospital, Battle Creek, October 14, following a long illness. He was 73 years old.

Mr. Nedreau was born in Toledo, Ohio, May 30, 1891. He attended Assumption College and was a veteran of World War I. He married Muriel I. Benstein of Detroit in 1921.

Surviving are his wife, Muriel, and two sons, Ramon, two daughters, Mrs. Janet Lindley of Dearborn and Mrs. Shirley Tucker of Farmington. Also surviving are a sister, Mrs. Eleanor Weipert of Detroit, and a brother, Edward Nedreau of Livonia. There are seven grandchildren.

Mr. Nedreau was a telephone operator at the Panama Exposition in 1939. He was active with the three Detroit News-Times, October 14, following a long illness. He was 73 years old.

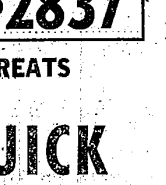

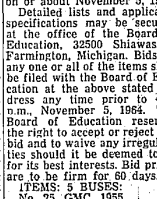

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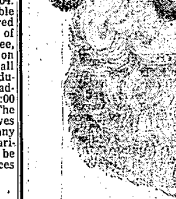
