F.E.A. Submits Salary Proposal To Board of Ed.

The Salary Committee of the Farmington Education Association met on November 2, 1964, and voted to submit a salary proposal for the Board of Education's consideration on November 9, 1984.
It is the committee's view, according to Gene Syverson, chalman, that any salary proposal for the year 1986-66 should place Farmington Public Schools in a position of being competitive with other school systems in the metropaltan area.
