

Bids Opened For Addition At Bond School

Bids for construction, mechanical and electrical work to be done on the Bond School addition were opened at a special meeting of the Farmington Board of Education on Wednesday, October 28.

Low bid on the general construction work was \$125,759, submitted by Schwanz Construction; second low bid was \$130,496, by Julian Wilson; and third lowest bid was \$139,000, by Wallace Construction Co.

Bids on the mechanical work were \$74,975, Hazen P. Hay; \$81,000, Evans Plumbing and Heating; and \$86,855, Magnolia Heating Service.

Low bid on the electrical work was \$24,970, by Johnson Durand Electric Co., Inc.; second lowest bid was \$25,990, by Electric Maintenance Service, Inc.; and third lowest was \$27,989, by Ellis Electric.

The bids were accepted and returned to the architect, J. MacDonald Jacob, for recommendation at the next regular meeting, November 9.

Agree to Only 2 Year Lease

The City Council learned Monday night that the Farmington Holding Co. which has been leasing the city a parcel of land for a parking lot on the south side of Grand River Ave. downtown was not inclined to extending a lease for any longer than two years.

Councilmen indicated at their last meeting that they felt this was a valuable piece of small parking lot area and would like to have a five-year lease if possible. The council has been leasing this property for \$1 per year plus paying all property taxes and taking care of maintenance.

The holding company indicated that it did not wish to extend a lease for more than two years since it is not yet certain what use it might wish to make of this land in conjunction with the other buildings which it owns around the vacant parcel.
