NFHS Faces Falcons Saturday Touting 7-1 Gridiron Record

OUTSTANDING performances were turned in by backblacks Jim Wrigglesworth and Gerald Bliss who averaged 18.4 and 14.5 yards per carry, respectively, and fullback Ron Peterson who averaged 16 yards per carry.

The Raiders now post one of the finest win-loss records in the area. The Raiders also now rank three full games above their "big" brothers, the Farmington "Birds." "Big" Brothers?

THE HIGHLY TAUTED North Farmington passing game was overshadowed by a hard-driving running game that amassed a total of 269 yards on the ground. Quarterback Bill Odershaw added 41 yards in the air to enable the Raiders to crack the 300 yard mark with a total of 309 yards.

HALFBACK TIDY Wrigglesworth picked up the first North Farmington touchdown early in the first quarter as he romped 51 yards on the second play from scrimmage. Tom Traushack blocked the point to put North Farmington in front, 7-0. Later in the opening quarter, Bill Odershaw plunged in from the four yard line to up the score.

GERALD BLISS provided the only touchdown of the second quarter as he slashed in from the five yard line to score. Traushack's attempt was blocked and North Farmington led at halftime, 19-0.

North Farmington picked up two more touchdowns in the second half, one in each of the final two quarters.

DEFENSIVE END Mike Majewski covered a Jackson fumble in the end zone for a touchdown. The Jackson player fumbled when he was hit and dropped by line-backer Skip Moore.

The final North Farmington touchdown was set by an interception by Junior Linebacker John Eckhold, with 25 seconds left in the game, quarterback Bill Odershaw plunged into the end zone from the one yard line for his second touchdown of the night.

Jackson was only to move the ball and scored only once in the game, and they picked up half of their total offense on their one scoring drive. A 40 yard interception return and several running plays gave Jackson only their third touchdown of the year.

Soph. Falcons Beat Roseville

The Little Falcons extended their winning streak to two games last week as they edged out Roseville 12-6.

The Little Falcons struck first in the first quarter on a five-yard dash by Fritz Simmons.

In the second quarter the Little Falcons struck again. This time QB Craig Anderson went to the air and hit Chris Norton on a screen pass for a 55 yard touchdown romp.

The Little Falcons held their 12 point lead until the middle of the fourth quarter as Roseville, scored on a screen pass, the score stood at 12-6 when the final sun sounded.

The Little Falcons who now hold a 3-1 record will try to break above the .500 mark today as they contest with North Farmington.

The third quarter was slow in action until the Rocket JV blocked a punt on Southfield's 35 yard line. Here the running attack of the Rockets bogged down and Mike Hawk took the air completing passes to Craig Dhue placing the ball on the 6 yard line.
