

Township of Farmington Board Proceedings

A Regular Meeting of the Township Board was held on November 13, 1951 at 8:00 p.m. in the Board Room, Township Office, Farmington, Michigan. Present were: Mr. Curt Hall, Chairman; Mr. Roy Avery, Vice-Chairman; Mr. Walter Opperhauser, Treasurer; Mr. Joseph T. Brennan, Township Attorney; Mr. F. D. Bissette, Clerk. Public Hearing was established for the 15th but in the absence of Election work the notices were not sent out in time.

MOTION by Cairns, supported by Avery, that date of November 23rd, 1951 be established for Public Hearing on necessary reverts in Koberter Park Subdivision, and that notice be given. Roll Call: 7 Yeas, 0 Nays. Carried unanimously.

MOTION by Walter, supported by Bissette, that matter of rezoning Lots 228, 229 and 231 of Kimberley Subdivision from RA-2 to O1 (Office) be tabled with the understanding that Kimberley Subdivision Association will be contacted immediately and call a general meeting and decision of that meeting transmitted back to Township Board for next regular meeting.

Mr. Hall explained that the rezoning is sent to County for action and it missed the October meeting for action. Two months went by before any one called a meeting.

Mr. Howard asked the Bank for another meeting to discuss the architecture.

Motion Carried-unanimous. Consideration of Bids for Maintenance Building.

Bids opened by Mr. Hall - 258 x 43 maintenance building - designed so that at future date it can be made into office building with second floor for steel construction. Estimated cost was \$8900. Base proposal according to specifications.

Leo J. Vandervennet & Sons, Ionia, \$11,950.00; Gordon E. Hall & Sons, Detroit, \$10,600.00; and J. P. Barrett, Farmington, \$11,950.00.

MOTION by Walter, supported by Avery, that bids received for construction of Maintenance Building be rejected, and that new bids be taken. Carried-unanimous.

Consideration of Water Problem in Meadowbrook Subdivision.

Critical problem in Meadowbrook Sub-4, 4 1/2 mile near Haggerty. Turbust Arm - going through there, driving well points, and now four houses have no water - wells dry. Under contract he is held harmless and will not do anything for these people.

MOTION by Duke, supported by Bissette, that the Township take any necessary action to provide water to the people in Meadowbrook Subdivision by whatever method possible. Carried-unanimous.

NEW BUSINESS

Mr. Cairns asked for Resolution that Treasurer be directed to deposit tax moneys in National Bank.

MOTION by Cairns, supported by Opperhauser, that said Treasurer, Elmer P. Avery is directed to deposit all public moneys, including tax moneys now in or coming into his hands as Treasurer, in the following Bank: National Bank, Detroit Branch No. 51. Carried-unanimous.

MOTION by Bissette, supported by Opperhauser, that payment be authorized of Vouchers Nos. 11822 through 11867 inclusive, and 12229 through 12253 inclusive, from the appropriate funds. Carried-unanimous.

Mr. Hall reported a suggestion has been made to change Question and Answer Period into Public Forum at Item 4 of the Agenda, limiting time up to half hour. Give consideration at next meeting.

Question and Answer Period: Mr. Hall was questioned on present salary.

Question on where last articles are stored - here or at Wheeler St. Proposed maintenance building will have storage for ground equipment and storage space. Not heated. How soon the proposed building would be converted is not known - depends on Township Board.

What part of Township money is allocated for recreation - \$7000. Recreation discussed.

Suggestion made that money for proposed building be used for recreation within the Township.

When will Farmington Township get water? Engineering is preparing. Financial Consultant will determine the number of customers needed to handle cost.

Kimberly Sub. will have Deora water as soon as mains are flushed out and OK.

In a recent issue of "The Link," the publication of the Plymouth State Home and Training School, an appeal was made for the donation of Cub Scout and Girl Scout uniforms. Suggestion made that new uniforms be formed. Thanks to the warm-hearted response, eight Cub Scout and two Brown Scout uniforms were donated. We thank each of the boys and girls and their parents for their generosity.

Our hospital coordinator, Norma Riequist, told at our October meeting of the need of various donations that would contribute to the programs and the needs of the mentally retarded children that range in age from one to twenty. THERE IS THE NEED for recreation equipment and it is requested that all donations be in good working condition. In this category, band instruments and pianos are needed. They would like to have bicycles, tricycles, kiddie cars without pedals, riding saucers and wagons. Also needed is sports equipment such as basketballs, softballs, gloves, ice skates and roller skates.

The list of academic needs or school supplies is lengthy and goes from alphabet letters to weaving supplies. Any educational toy for any age group can be used. For example, construction sets such as Lincoln Logs, Lego or Kenner are needed. They also request house-keeping toys such as brooms, ironing boards, dust pans, mops and dishes. They would like story books that are simple with large print and good illustrations and also blank scrap

books and coloring books. Do you have any musical toys or instruments to donate? Hand puppets and marionettes with strings for the cerebral palsied are requested. They need record players and records for sing-along, acting out and story, seasonal and for listening and relaxing. They can use model kits of cars, planes and boats (new of course). The wooden Play-Longer puzzles that your child no longer uses would be much appreciated.

THE HOSPITAL suggests in the category of clothing, new items are preferable but used clothing is acceptable if it is in excellent condition and requires no repair. All sizes for males and females are needed. Listed are: aprons, blouses, dresses, shirts, slips, nightgowns and MuMitt's for female patients and neckties, shirts, shorts, slacks and sweat shirts with hoods for the males. For either sex, they need boots, gloves and mittens, jackets and coats, robes, pajamas, slippers, shoes, snowsuits and sweaters.

THE LIST of personal needs is varied and includes toiletries and other items such as address books, billfolds, pens and pencils, playing cards, magazine subscriptions, and stationery.

Through the efforts of our annual spring card party, the Women of Kendallwood Farms have contributed to the orthopedic fund. More equipment is needed such as adult walkers, braces (new or used), heelcord stretchers, orthopedic shoes and children's wheel chairs.

As you see, the list of gift suggestions is long and varied. Remembering the response to our appeal for the uniforms, we know that we can count on your generosity to help fulfill the needs of the Plymouth State Home and Training School.
