As another form of honoring Olympic Champion and former FHS grad, Rex Cawley, a new award at Farmington Senior High has been originated in his name.

"The Rex Cawley Award" will be presented each spring to the track performer who has contributed the most to the squad in the areas of spirit, effort, and performance. The award will be in the form of a plaque on which the annual winner's name will be engraved.

The idea for the award first originated among members of the Farmington Exchange Club, who desired another form of recognition for Farmington Senior High's distinguished alumni.

North Farmington Debate Teams Setting Outstanding Records

North Farmington High School is once again establishing an outstanding record in debate. The coach, Judith A. Rohm, has selected the Varsity and Jr. Varsity squads; and already the record of judged debates stands at 16 wins and three losses for this year.

The debaters have defeated Birmingham Groves with a four win, no loss record. They also over-powered Thurston High School with a three win, one loss record. On Saturday, November 7, the debaters traveled to Mount Clemens as last year's championship defenders of this ten-school tournament. The Varsity again tied for first place with Cass Tech and Belle Creek Central. All three schools had a five win, 1 loss record at the Mount Clemens tournament.

NORTH FARMINGTON debaters have been selected along with the top debate powers in the state to attend an invitational Varsity Tournament at Michigan State University, December 12. This is a real honor since only a few schools were invited to the tournament.

Millie Davidge is this year's Varsity Second Affirmative. According to Miss Rohm, she is one of the finest debaters in the entire State. Maggie Soderquist, the only junior on the squad, is First Affirmative on the Varsity. Maggie is a polished and skilled speaker and she adds great strength to the Varsity. Cathy Glessner is First Negative on the Varsity. Cathy is enthusiastic and dynamic in refutation. Jerome Johnson is Second Negative combining with Cathy on the Varsity. Jerome has outstanding knowledge and ability in logic and persuasion. This powerful Varsity is debating the National proposition: "Resolved that Nuclear Weapons Should Be Controlled By An International Organization."

THE JR. VARSITY is undefeated in league debating with a four win, no loss record. This strong squad is made up of Affirmative debaters, Steve Kinghorn and Tom Carley, and Negative debaters, Bobbie Wieder and Bob Huber. This squad is a hard-working, well-organized, intelligent and poised team. They are respected and admired in the world of debate.

Miss Rohm feels it is even a stronger squad than her last year's team which brought back to North Farmington a League Championship trophy, a Mount Clemens Championship trophy, a District First Place trophy and a University of Michigan trophy for outstanding debate through the entire year.

Electric Rates Being Reduced

The Michigan Public Service Commission has given approval to the Detroit Edison Company for a reduction in electric rates amounting to \$3,550,000 per year.

The new rate schedule has been under joint study by the staff of the Commission and Detroit Edison for several months.

The officials pointed out that the reduction would be of greatest benefit to residential customers using more than 500 kilowatt hours per month and to commercial customers.

The last Detroit Edison rate increase was in 1948—45 years ago. Since that time the company has decreased residential rates on two occasions—in 1959 and in 1963. These rate decreases, together with the greater use of electricity have lowered the average cost, per kilowatt-hour, to residential customers by 15 per cent since 1949.

"Destroy Old Plates," Hare Warns Motorists

Michigan motorists buying their 1965 license plates early were cautioned by Secretary of State James M. Hare to be careful that their old plates "are confiscated or kept" in a safe place until they are no longer valid after February 28 of 1965.

"Under Michigan law," Hare said, "the motorist is responsible for his license plates. So to protect against possible problems of another person's getting the plates and getting into trouble, we urge each new license purchaser to make sure his old plates do not fall into the wrong hands."

Hare recommended keeping them "in a safe place" until they are no longer valid and then getting rid of them. Another method is to cut them up with a metal cutter, Hare said. New 1965 plates went on sale November 2.

Although pedestrians have the right of way in crosswalks, it is out of line for a pedestrian to stand in the way of a driver to maintain his "keeping" momentum on a slippery uphill street, according to Farmington City Chief of Police Maurice D. Folz.
