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Question Raised On Machinery Being Used

Question was raised before the City Council at its regular meeting Monday night as to the limitations on the size of machinery that can be used in the Farmington Sheet Metal building on Orchard Lake Road, a short distance north of Grand River.
Raising the question was Ed Fielesman, 22945 Orchard Lake Road, who said that the building on Orchard Lake Road is being put in operation in this building only a few days ago that causes considerable vibration in his home.

Fielesman was advised that the property where the sheet metal building is located is zoned M-1 for light industry. The zoning ordinance of 1963 stipulates that no machine or equipment that can be operated under this zoning classification is to be used. In a general discussion that it is stipulated that this equipment must be located a substantial distance from adjoining residential property.
The city manager agreed to check into the matter immediately to ascertain whether the equipment is larger or noisier than is allowed under M-1 zoning. He will also check to see if there is any violation with regard to the definite restriction that is located on adjoining homes and whether it is properly mounted outside the building.

FIELESMAN also questioned the kind of business operations being conducted from the building to the north of the main building, a large or smaller building is located on Grand River. County Explains Delay on Light

The signal light at this intersection will operate as a full "stop and go" light between the hours of 7 a.m. and 10 p.m. daily but will convert over to a red flasher for the late night time and early morning hours.

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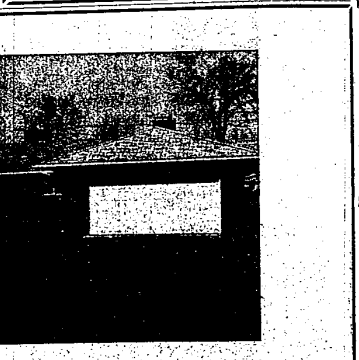
