completing work for his Ph.D.  
at the University of Michigan.  
His Doctoral dissertation will  
be based on his study of the  
children in a Detroit neighbor-  
hood where he and his family  
lived for two years. Mr. Kry-  
stall's insights based on his ex-  
tensive study in Social Anthro-  
pology and his peculiar experi-  
ence in a society founded in  
rigid segregation should prove  
valuable and interesting.  
BECAUSE OF HIS back  
ground and his ability as a  
speaker, Mr. Krystall's re-  
marks will be most appealing to  
the citizens of Farmington,  
since he will direct his talk to  
the problems of conflict be-  
tween white suburbanites over  
integration in housing. The Center  
for the Study of Conflict  
Resolution at the University  
has arranged for Mr. Krystall's  
visit.
