## Quakertown Questers Host Mary MacDonald

Quakertown Questers were enlightened on the "symbolism of Christmas Traditions" when special guest Miss Mary MacDonald of the Dearborn Historical Museum spoke at the Quakertown Questers' November 18 meeting held at the home of Mrs. Dana Freeman, 34501 Quaker Valley.

Miss MacDonald's talk emphasized that our beginning Christmas celebrations were an expression of religious devotion and secular pagantry. Explanations included the Wreath—a symbol of Christ's conquest over death; Holly—the red berries representing Christ's blood; and the branches, the thorns of crucifixion. Evergreen Branches—symbolic of indestructible life; the Wisemen—submission of worldly power to Delly; Angels—messengers of God.

Other traditional Christmas Symbols mentioned were the Magi, Stars, Mistletoe, the Manger, Creche, 12th-night festivities and St. Nicholas.

IT WAS ALSO discussed that the Christmas Tree was first introduced to England by Prince Albert in 1841 the first Christmas card was published in 1843, and the first Christmas ornaments were made in Germany in 1850.

According to Miss MacDonald, from earliest times food has ranked high as a way of celebrating the holiday. The offering of food expressed man's willingness to open heart and home to friends and strangers.

It was learned that plum pudding began as "Plum Soup," and that an early recipe for Mince Pie was NOT sweet, but called for cut-up pieces of various types of fowl! In England's great halls back in the days of nobility, goose, stuffed swan, partridge, boar's head and

roasted peacock with the gorgeous colored plumage were served in pompous style. Prior to Miss MacDonald's presentation, refreshments were served from an antique table in the Freeman dining room, where delicately spiced candles arranged in clusters gleamed against polished wood, and serving pieces in old glass and china further enhanced the aura of traditional hospitality.

**IN ADDITION** to fifteen regular members who attended, special guests included Miss Turin Korstad of Norway, and Mmes. Gerry Bonatz, Jean Draper, Be Gibson, Helen Meisel, Mary Throckmorton and June Thompson.

Since the Questers is a national organization formed for the purpose of study and research into the field of antiquities, Quakertown Chapter includes as part of its yearly activities a December "silent auction," proceeds of which are turned over to the Farmington Library for the purchase of new books on antiquities and related subjects.
