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

U of M Honors Council Takes 2 Local Girls

The highly-select Honors Council of The University of Michigan has admitted 417 entering freshmen to its program of enriched studies.

Comprising 12 per cent of the incoming freshmen, the College of Literature, Science and the Arts, these Honors students were invited to join the program on the basis of high school records, scholastic aptitude and achievement scores, and academic promise.

THE HONOR students from Farmington are: Lorraine A. Chorkey, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Chorkey of 23331 Baintree; and Gloria E. Mingo, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Glen Mingo of 23331 Gloria Lane.

Otto G. Graf, director of the Honors Council, explains that the program provides several types of unique academic opportunities. Among its features are special counseling, interdepartmental honors courses and honors sections of regular courses, opportunities to participate in research projects of faculty members, faculty-student discussion groups, and directed summer reading for credit.

In the junior and senior years students continue to work or join the program take special core courses in the field of concentration, leading to the honors degree.

THE COUNCIL was established in 1957. There are now 1,077 undergraduates participating.

Grat points to the program's success as shown by the achievements of the May graduating class. Almost 70 per cent of the 141 Honors graduates attained "honors" or "high honors" for academic achievement and independent work in their fields of concentration.

Over 90 per cent (142) are currently in graduate or professional school, many of one or more of the 122 scholarships and fellowships which were awarded to individuals in support of study here and abroad.
