Amend Twp Ord Regulations on Multiple Units

Two amendments to the Farmington Township zoning ordinance covering regulations on multiple family housing developments were unanimously adopted by the Township Board at its regular meeting Monday night.

at its regular meeting Monday night.

One of the ordinance changes requires that complete site plans be submitted and approved by the Township Board before any construction of apartments or other types of apartments or other types of multiple family development is started. This change has been called for to give better protection to nearby landowners from undestrable development or improper screenings which would

undestrable development or improper screening which would be detrimental to their land values.

The second ordinance change will make it mandatory for apartment unit developers to provide two parking spaces for each multiple dwelling unit they build rather than just one per each unit as is presently stipulated.
