To Run in 14th District  
Senator Farrell Roberts

Senator Farrell Roberts announced this week that he will be a candidate for the 14th State Senate District, for which he was elected in the November election. Roberts did not seek re-election to the State Senate this fall as an attempt to gain the newly created Second Judicial Court of Appeals.

Although unsuccessful in his bid for the Court of Appeals, Senator Roberts was persuaded by an influential group of Oakland County Republicans to run for the 14th District Senate seat. This term expires January 1, 1985.

According to a story published in the Pontiac Press earlier this week, the date for the special election for January 25 with the successful primary candidates to vote in the final election on February 15.

**FARRELL E. ROBERTS**, Oakland County State Senator and Chairman of the Senate Judiciary Committee, is a 42-year-old attorney currently serving his second term in the Senate after two terms as a State Representative. He is a partner in the Pontiac law firm of Diener and Roberts, 2657 Orchard Lake Road, Pontiac.

Roberts and his wife, the former Phyllis L. Miller of Detroit, have two sons, Mark and Bruce. Their home is at 2486 Lafayette, West Bloomfield Township. He and his family are members of the First Presbyterian Church in West Bloomfield Township.

ROBERTS WAS graduated from the U.S. Naval Academy at Annapolis and the University of Michigan Law School. Prior to his election to the Legislature in 1968 he worked in the Detroit law firm and served as an assistant prosecuting attorney in Oakland County.

Roberts is a member of the Oakland County, Michigan, and American Bar Associations. He is also a member of the American Judiciary Society and Delta Theta Phi Law Fraternity.

Delay Purchase Of Police Cars

Three bids for two new police cars were received and opened by the Township Board at a regular meeting Monday night but no action was taken on deciding who to buy from.

One new car is to be purchased. The other car is to be purchased from the Township Board.

One of the bids came from Town & Country Dodge, another from Dameron Motor Sales, both with dealerships in Farmington Township, and the third from Pontiac Retail Sales.

Supervisor Carl Hall said that the police department favored Pontiac's because of previous experiences with repair and maintenance problems and also because they found it impossible to get in and out of some other makes of cars with their hats on.

On the supervisor's suggestion, a special committee of five, headed by Supervisor Hall, was named to study the matter more thoroughly in all respects including prices quoted and delivery. The committee was also to make a recommendation.

Trustee Byron Wall stated that he felt favorable consideration should be given to buying from Pontiac or the other of the two local dealers who are substantial taxpayers in the township.

African Peace Corps Duty For Miss Dowding

Farmington is well represented in the U.S. Peace Corps with the announcement this week that a third Farmington girl, Marlene Dowding, has completed her training and is ready for assignment abroad. Earlier this fall Marjorie Lam and Pat Cobb, both graduates of Farmington High School, along with Marlene Dowding, were assigned to Peace Corps assignments in Peru and Morocco, respectively.

Miss Dowding, who trained for her Peace Corps mission at Syracuse University in New York, will leave for Malawi, Africa the day after Christmas to take up her assignment. She will teach school of the secondary level in Malawi.

MALAWI is a young African country just getting its independence after more than 50 years as a British Colony. The country is located between two well known African nations, the Union of South Africa to the north and Tanganyika to the south.

The educational level in Malawi is unusual, Marlene pointed out, since it is their practice to send abroad the most intelligent students to further their education while the others remain behind to teach school and learn trades. The Malawian educational system is a total area the Peace Corps hopes to concentrate in and the field in which Miss Dowding will apply herself for the next two years.

**MISS DOWDING** received her secondary teaching certificate from Michigan State University and has already started work on her Master's degree in education and is currently teaching in a public school in Farmington. She also shipped to Malawi along with her luggage which should keep her stocked up during the Peace Corps assignment. She also is looking forward to the 30 days leave which Peace Corps volunteers are allowed during their assignments to visit outside their assigned countries.

Certain areas which are of little to Peace Corps volunteers in Africa at the present time, however, localized disturbances are apt to break out almost anywhere on the African continent and one of the missions of the Peace Corps is to cement American relations and prevent these young independent nations from aligning with the Soviet Union.

**MURLENE E. DOWDING**, daughter of Mrs. M. R. Dowding, is one of 105 Peace Corps Volunteers now on home leave prior to leaving for Malawi on December 12.

Miss Dowding and her group will participate in two projects: cooperative management and secondary education - joining the Peace Corps with the Peace Corps Volunteers already at work in the new African republic. Present Peace Corps projects in Malawi include a rural extension program, health programs, and law enforcement.

Agricultural cooperatives are a vital factor in Malawi's economic growth. They are to get a fair price for their goods, and to obtain credit for purchasing machinery, improved seeds, fertilizers, and other necessities. The Peace Corps Volunteers will assist in the administration of the cooperatives, and in training Malawi co-workers.

**MISS DOWDING** and the majority of these Volunteers will teach in secondary schools and teacher training colleges. Subjects will include math, English, history, geography and home economics.

Miss Dowding's group trained for 14 weeks at Syracuse University. They studied the history and culture of Malawi, United States history and institutions, and social affairs. Although their work will be conducted mainly in English, the trainees also studied some of the Malawian languages spoken in Malawi. The teachers were also instructed in teaching techniques, procedures and the Malawian curriculum and examination system. They will be expected to work with cooperatives, study bookkeeping and general business practices.
