

Yule Caution Urged By Twp. Police Chief

Farmington Township Police Chief Irv. Yakes this week issued a warning to area residents to guard against the threat of burglary during the holiday season by making sure homes are well secured before going out even for short periods of time.

Chief Yakes emphasized that presents and gifts left in the home at Christmas time also present a prime opportunity for burglars and sneak thieves. He also warned motorists to make sure their car is locked while shopping, a good practice to remember all year long, the Chief said.

Twp. Election

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Election began, Clerk Floyd Cairns had revealed that an initial check of the petitions calling for the referendum vote had been made by his office. A total of 1,676 names were on the petitions and only 52 of them were found to be invalid, he commented.

The trustees' action of Nov. 2 at a special meeting was to grant an increase in pay to the supervisor from \$10,000 to \$15,000 per year; the clerk, from \$8,500 to \$11,500 per year; and the treasurer, from \$8,000 to \$10,000 per year.

Detroit Water

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The present water situation in Meadowbrook, a short while back a few homes in the subdivision had either completely or almost completely lost their water supply from private shallow wells because of pumping operations required by the contractor putting a portion of the "Arabian" Sewer line through that subdivision. Angry homeowner protests resulted.

Supervisor Hall said that water had now come back in private wells at these or four of the homes that had lost their supply while pumping was going on. Only four households were still finding it necessary to take water from large barrels being kept filled by the township for non-drinking uses, he said.

THE SUPERVISOR added further that at least three of four other homeowners were going ahead with having their wells-pumped to a little deeper to get to an adequate ground water supply. He stated that the cost of doing this was running about \$100 per family.

Hall stated that if a cost estimate hearing could be held within the next month he was of the opinion Detroit water facilities for Meadowbrook Hills could be in use by September of 1965.

Ft. School Sports To Be Televised Soon

Selected Farmington high school athletic events will soon be televised by station WKBD, a new UHF television station broadcasting on Channel 50.

The Farmington Board of Education at a regular meeting on December 14, passed a motion directing that the office of physical education be authorized to work out an agreement with the television station.

IN A LETTER TO the school district, WKBD officials stated that their plan is to select outstanding events in basketball, football, swimming, tennis, and track from the schedules of Detroit Public Schools, the Catholic High School League, and various suburban leagues.

These events would be scheduled Monday through Friday from 6 to 7:30 p.m. Some events would be broadcast live, but most would be on videotape.

SELECTION OF THE events and teams to be telecast would be made by the station. The advertising sponsors would be selected in good taste in accordance with the code of the National Association of Television Broadcasters. Mutual agreement can be reached in advance as to categories of advertisers that are not acceptable, the letter concluded.

Youth Comm. Sets Meeting

At a meeting of the Greater Farmington Youth Guidance Committee held recently, Robert Eddy, minister of the Farmington Universalist Church, was elected chairman for the coming year.

Named committee vice chairman was Hugo Watson, head of the special education department of the Farmington public schools. Mrs. John Kinghorn was co-secretary.

The committee has indicated extreme interest in working with and for the various clubs and organizations of the community on matters involving youth and has called a special meeting for Tuesday, January 5, to meet with various representatives of the clubs, organizations and PTA groups in the community. The meeting will be held in the Youth Guidance Committee office at 3423 Grand River Ave. just west of the Detroit Edison office, starting at 8 p.m.

A review of the work that the Youth Guidance Committee has done since its formation will be made followed by general discussion with regard to planned activities for the future and any suggestions that representatives of other organizations might have.
