REPEAL OF EXISTING ZONING ORDINANCE AND OFF-STREET PARKING ORDINANCE AND ADOPTION OF NEW ZONING ORDINANCE

The City Council of the City of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan, will meet at 8:00 p.m., Monday, January 11, 1965, at the City Hall, 23600 Liberty Street, Farmington, Michigan, to hear all interested persons regarding the adoption of a proposed new Zoning Ordinance entitled:

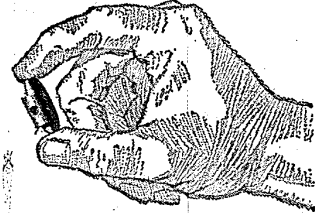
An Ordinance to repeal Sections 5.1 through 5.27 inclusive of Chapter 38 of Title V, and Sections 5.340 through 5.349 inclusive of Chapter 41 of Title V of the Code of the City of Farmington, Michigan; to enact the official Zoning Ordinance of the City of Farmington, Michigan; to establish in the City of Farmington, Michigan, as amended, districts to regulate the use of land and structures therein; to regulate and restrict the location of trades and industries and the location of buildings designed for specified uses; to regulate and determine the area of yards, courts, and other open spaces; to regulate the density of population; to provide for the administration and enforcement of this ordinance; to provide for a Board of Zoning Appeals, and its powers and duties; and to provide a penalty for the violation of the terms thereof.

Such ordinance is proposed in pursuance of authority conferred by the provisions of Act 207 of the Public Acts of the State of Michigan of 1921, as amended.

All interested persons will be given a chance to express their views at the above time and place. Any other information desired regarding the above proposal is available at the office of the City Clerk.

Harold House, Jr. of Farmington is among a group of Bethel College students planning to spend their Christmas vacation as part of Operation Mobilization in Texas and Mexico.

Operation Mobilization was founded in 1957 by a group of Christian young men who crossed the Mexican border with a truckload of Christian literature and distributed it in an effort to "Christ to the People."

THE GROWTH of the movement has been phenomenal. For seven years there has been an annual Christmas trip to Mexico. Trips to other countries such as France, Belgium, Italy, and Austria have been made and during the past few months teams have worked in Turkey, Iraq, India, Persia, and other Middle East countries.

This is the second year that students from Bethel College in Mishawaka, Indiana have participated in the Mexican "Operation Mobilization."

Operation Mobilization is a legally recognized charity cooperative in both Mexico and the United States. The director for the United States is Lew Williams who is presently a student at Moody Bible Institute.

THE BETHEL COLLEGE group left Mishawaka on December 18 and will return on January 3. Ken Webb, a Canadian from Stayner, Ontario and James Jordan from Mishawaka, Indiana are the leaders of the Bethel team. The group joined with students at Taylor University, Upland, Indiana and drove to Mexico.

The literature is provided by "Send the Light, Inc." of Wyckoff, New Jersey where the headquarters of the movement are located.

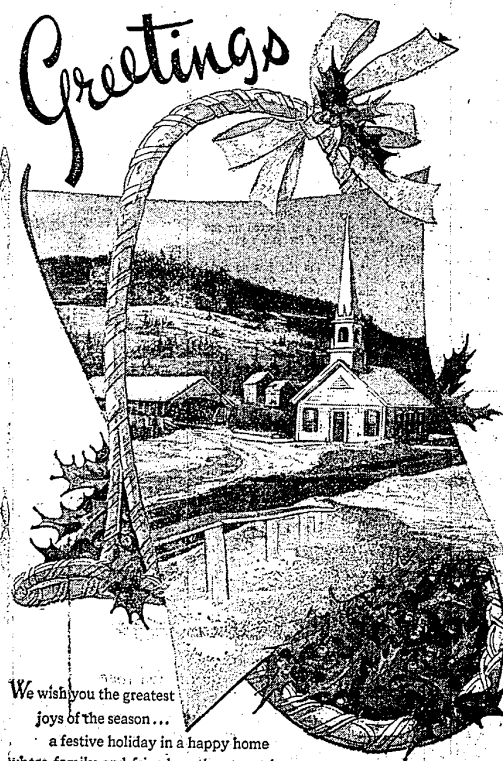
