Class Offered For Diabetics

A series of five classes for diabetics and their families will be offered again this winter by the Botsford General Hospital in Farmington.

This series of classes will be held at Farmington Senior High School, Shawnee at a n.d. Orchard Lake Road, in Room 107-E.

The class material will follow the same pattern currently being used by the Oakland County Department of Health and will be without charge. Each series will consist of five lessons, taught by Mrs. Florence Meiers, M.S., A.D.A., Executive Dietitian, and Mr. John Collins, Registered Nurse.

TWO CLASSES will be from 7 to 9 p.m. on the following dates: Tuesday, January 12; Tuesday, January 19; Tuesday, January 26; Tuesday, February 2; and Tuesday, February 9.

The classes will stress the importance of the diabetic's cooperation with his physician and the responsibility of the patient in caring for himself in order to lead a healthy and useful life.

DIABETICS MUST have the written approval of their physicians to attend these classes. Class enrollment is limited to 15.

Keep Holidays Safe and Sane

Charles Dickens, in his "A Christmas Carol," described Scrooge as a man who, after his change of heart, knew how to keep Christmas well.

Knowing how to appreciate Christmas has always been a desirable trait, and Farmington City Chief of Police Maurice D. Foltz believes he has some excellent pointers in that direction provided by the International Association of Chiefs of Police.

"Not that I'm trying to interfere with family traditions," the chief hastened to say. "What I'm concerned about is that the year-end holiday season has been marred by so many tragic accidents in recent years. In my business it almost gets so that when you wish someone a Merry Christmas and Happy New Year what you're really doing is hoping he'll enjoy a safe holiday."

ON THE PRACTICAL side of doing just that, Chief Foltz pointed out that National Safety Council statistics show a majority of fatal holiday accidents are associated with drinking.

"That's why the council has come out against office parties and holiday liquor flows freely," he observed.

"And we sometimes overlook that drinking and going out into traffic is just as dangerous for pedestrians as for drivers," he added.

"Let's remember that to celebrate Christmas and the New Year holiday well means avoiding accident involvement, and we can at least double our chances of doing that by refusing to drink before driving."

"I have recommended using tire chains for a long time," says Farmington Township Police Chief Irv Yakes, "for just two reasons: First, the National Safety Council's Committee on Winter Driving Hazards has proved their value; second, so have I." But chains can't guarantee to do the whole job of getting a driver through the winter without causing a dangerous traffic stoppage, the chief warns: "An empty gas tank or worn-out battery will cause any car to die. So fill the tank and check the battery,
