## Local Students Attend Lecture On Science

Six Farmington high school students, Daniel Mancuso of 43901 Braebury Ridge and Richard Korte of 2202 Wexley, both of Our Lady of Sorrows High School; Douglas L. McDuchon of 35415 Springland, both students at North Farmington High School, were invited to attend the 1964 Holiday Lecture Series presented December 29 at the Engineering Society of Detroit.

Noted astronomer and astrophysicist, Professor J. Allen Hynek, addressed over 700 Detroit area junior and senior high school students and 200 science teachers. A teacher and two selected students from each high school in the metropolitan area were invited to participate.

PROFESSOR HYNK, chairman of the department of astronomy at Northwestern University, gave a morning and an afternoon lecture on that day. He spoke on "Our place in Space" and "Satellite. Mariner to Mars."

Holder of BS, MS and PhD degrees in astrophysics from Ohio State University, Prof. Hynek is an astronomer of international fame. He led the Ohio State University Eclipse Expedition to Iran in 1954. As associate director of the Smithsonian Astrophysical Observatory, he was in charge of the Optical Satellite Tracking Program from 1956 to 1960.

Sponsored by the Engineering Society of Detroit, Education Committee, the Holiday Lecture Series was inaugurated last year in collaboration with the American Association for the Advancement of Science.
