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Democratic Club Elects A New Slate of Officers

Newly elected and re-elected officers of the Farmington Democratic Club have pledged to continue the organization's program of promoting improved community programs.

1965 officers were elected at the club's meeting last week. They are: Chairman Aldo Vagnozzi, Vice Chairman Charles Weissinger, Corresponding Secretary Elaine Petty, Recording Secretary Marianne Macilvaine, Treasurer John Bain and Auditor Harry Zuchinski.

"WE HAVE TOO much concern over the future of Farmington," said Vagnozzi, "and we must work for actions by our government units which are in the best interests of all the residents." Vagnozzi told the club members.

He said the recent attack on the Democratic position by the Republican leader of Farmington Township is another example of the fear the present township administration has of citizen participation in government.

"The Republican officials apparently want us and other groups and individuals in the community to give up our legal

right to petition; to appear at township meetings and offer suggestions for improved programs as well as to criticize these programs when we are not in the public interest; and to question the actions of public officials when we feel those actions are not for the common good," Vagnozzi declared.

"THE REPUBLICAN'S officials want us to roll over and play dead. We're not going to do it. We owe it to the people who supported us to keep fighting for the programs we advocated in the recent election."

VAGNOZZI NOTED that as a result of citizens speaking out at township meetings some progress had been made, often over strenuous objection or indifference of the present township officials. He ticked off a partial list of these gains as follows:

1 - Approval of sewers for the Nine Mile (Middlebelt) area where septic tanks are overflowing into the street ditches causing a health hazard.

2 - Installation of a toll-free telephone line to the county offices in Pontiac was ridiculed when he first proposed it during the campaign.

3 - Defeat of a sand-removal operation that would have created a safety hazard for children going to the Girl School. Vagnozzi noted that the Democratic precinct delegate in the area, worked with other individuals and the PTAs to convince the township zoning board to reject the request.

4 - Winning of a long-overdue system whereby citizens can attend at township meetings on items that come up before the township board.

5 - Stopping of the construction of commercial property on land zoned residential (Detroit's Nine Mile and Grand River) where a golf, by township officials had resulted in the issuance of a building permit to allow such construction.

"Much more needs to be done if Farmington is to become the kind of community we can all be proud of," Vagnozzi said. "We will continue to work towards that end."

With actual demonstrations of careless handling of fuses, cleaning fluids, gasoline and aerosol cans, Sgt. J. Harrison, City of Farmington, Public Safety officer, exhibited various fires start, at the January meeting of Cub Pack 168.

Using special equipment built for his talk, Sgt. Harrison demonstrated common errors made by householders that often cause fires.

ONE PANEL, consisting of five bright lights and a piece of wire, connected to a heating element, showed how an overloaded circuit immediately causes the wire to burn into flames.

Fueling a power mower in operation was demonstrated by Sgt. Harrison, resulting in "popping" oil that would have been an explosion in an actual mower. Other warnings demonstrated how cleaning fluid can travel downstairs from the kitchen and be ignited by a pilot light.

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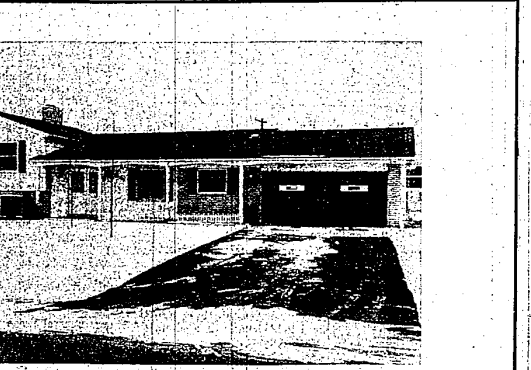
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
