Library Board, Brent Sauter of 21323 Birchwood, in an executive session prior to the regular City Council meeting on Monday night of this week, a change in this original proposal may be made.

It was suggested during this executive session that a change in this original proposal might be to ask for only one-half mill for the capital improvement program planned for a 20 year period instead of the one mill over ten years as originally suggested. This would mean a total levy of one mill instead of one and one-half with one half mill going for operations as is the case presently and the other half to liquidate indebtedness on the bond issue to finance the improvements proposed over a longer period of time.

A SPECIAL session of the Library Board has been set for Saturday of this week, January 23, to evaluate the alternate proposal made by city officials Monday night, Sauter said.

The new plan will be for official discussion before the Farmington Township Board for the first time at its regular meeting on Monday night, January 25.

In private discussion with Sauter following the regular Council meeting, it was learned that the total capital improvement program planned would run approximately \$1.5 million. He emphasized the fact that if local approval is given to the proposed library expansion plan, the district would qualify to receive a substantial federal grant to help underwrite a portion of the cost.

SAUTER quoted a number of statistics to show the tremendous growth of the public library system in the last five years and to emphasize the need for more facilities and services as the city and township continue to grow.

During the past five years, he said, patronage at the library has jumped from 9,000 to 19,000 yearly and there has been an increase in the number of books being taken out of over 100 percent. The library is now being kept open 60 hours a week and even though there is a large increase in the number of books available on the local libraries shelves it is far short of the number recommended per capita for a good library system, Sauter commented.

Education last week.

In describing the course, Dr. Grams said, "The plan provides for an ongoing community education program which violates no one's freedom or individuality. Parents may participate by choice."

Now that the recommendation has been approved, Dr. Grams and his associate will be working closely with Farmington's staff committee in screening and training qualified instructors for the course. Since this is the first program of its kind, the committee will develop a syllabus and other materials for the instructors.

Dr. Grams, author of "Children and Their Parents" published in 1963, holds a B.S. degree in Education from Concordia College, an M.A. from DePaul University, and a Ph.D. from Northwestern University.

A CERTIFIED Consulting Psychologist, he has held posts in elementary teacher and principal; instructor and assistant professor of Education and Psychology, DePaul University; staff psychologist, Lutheran Charities, Chicago; Head Psychologist, Dyess Memorial Hospital, Chicago; associate professor of Psychology, Wisconsin State College; and associate professor in the Institute of Child Development, University of Minnesota.

Official public hearing notices giving greater details on the rezoning and the additional tax zoning ordinance text proposed appear on Pages 4B, 5B and 7B in this week's issue of The Farmington Enterprise. This is the second publication of these official notices. The first publication of each of the three separate notices appeared in The Enterprise on January 7.

THE BOARD will continue its review of a request for rezoning of property adjoining the Flamingo Trailer Park and also considering changes to the original zoning an approximate 75 acre parcel at 14 Mile and Orchard Lake roads. Those requesting rezoning on this property have not followed through in making use of it for the purpose for which they got it rezoned.

Also up for preliminary review will be for rezoning requested on a portion of a lot at the northwest corner of 12 Mile Road and Rollcrest. The owner seeks to have the B-1 (business) zoning extended slightly to permit the construction of a beauty parlor there.

Plat plans on developments proposed at three different locations are also on the agenda. One is a plan for development of a 101 acre parcel at the southwest corner of 13 Mile and Farmington Road. The second one proposes an approximately 30 acre development on Middlebelt Road north of Ten Mile. The third is final plans for development proposed on the triangular parcel at the southwest corner of Tuck Road and Shawnessy.

was done after considerable study of past expenditures and anticipated future growth and development. At the time of this writing, there is no specific indication as to the effect of the total millage levy. However, the Clarenceneville Board of Education indicated that the board's proposition would not cause any increase in the tax rate. The four-mill levy may cause some change in the rate.

It is not the intent of the Clarenceneville Board of Education to levy two of the four mills should the State agencies rule in favor of the district, to which reference was made above. The length of time for the millage would be for a period of five years; at which time the question would be again brought presented to the people for their re-consideration.

DUE TO THE FACT that the tax valuation book of each pupil has dropped approximately \$1,000 in the last three years, the Clarenceneville Board of Education has found itself facing certain problems in meeting the increased costs of operation and to provide the expanded program desired by the people. It is anticipated that this year's disbursements will approximate \$40,000 more than receipts. This excess expenditure was carefully considered in light of the fact that additional mills would be available in 1965-66 from the shipping center to help off-set the present school year deficit.

While it is true that the shipping center will bring in additional funds in the future, the existing program of expanded facilities and offerings, and for any consideration of improvement for the future, THE CLARENCENEVILLE Board of Education indicated that the decision to place a four-mill question on the ballot.

Library Board Asks for Vote On Tax Millage

The Farmington District Library Board has asked the Farmington Township Board to approve placing a proposition on the ballot for the Spring Election to seek a renewal of the present five-tenths of a mill tax levy which is supporting the District Library and due to expire next year.

The Library Board asked the Township Board also to place on the ballot a proposition seeking an additional four mill tax levy for a proposed library expansion program of capital improvements and necessary operational expenses.

The five-tenths of a mill would be levied over a 20-year period and the one-mill period would be levied for a ten-year period. The Board will take up the request at its next, regularly scheduled meeting, Monday night, January 25.

Public Hearing Held On Park Hill Sewers

The Farmington Township Board held a public hearing on the necessity for sanitary sewers in the proposed Park Hill Subdivision special assessment sewer district at a special meeting Monday night, January 18, in the Township Hall.

There were no written objections to the establishment of the proposed sewer district which would service 69 lots and cost an estimated \$10,200. No date has been set on the second hearing on cost estimates for the proposed sewer district.
