100 Acre "Hunters Ridge" Proposed In Township

"Hunters Ridge," a 100 acre residential development, was proposed to the Township Zoning Board at their January 23 meeting. The location of the proposed 1,000 unit development is in section 3, south of 14 Mile Road and west of Orchard Lake Road. (The land parcel is that which the Township Zoning Board had previously rezoned from residential to commercial and has been under consideration for rezoning back to the original zoning due to performance factors.)

The Mel Construction Company, proponents of the development, made an impressive presentation of their plans to the zoning board using color slides, exact drawings, and a scale model of the project.

THE PROPOSERS explained how they had researched the area, studying topography, land use, population, area economic character, highway traffic, and general appearance of the land and surrounding area. They reported that they found heavy traffic flow from three main highways at one corner of the property, and existing commercial facilities and existing commercial areas near the location.

According to their studies, "There is a real need for housing multiple homes in this area. These homes are needed by professional people, married or single, and by older couples who desire to lease a fine residence rather than maintain their own homes."

HUNTERS RIDGE, as proposed, will be entered through a gate house which will have a guard 24 hours a day. The main building, "Hunters Inn" will house the management office, service departments, parcel receiving room, and clubhouse, entertainment, and health facilities.

Three recreational areas will offer nature trails, tennis, basketball and cabanas. Service roads will be maintained throughout and entrance-exit roads are to be located so that an additional traffic should not disturb adjacent residential areas. A thick belt of trees and shrubbery is planned around the development.

THE LIVING AREA is to be "architecturally controlled" with no two buildings alike. Floor plans were shown of the various buildings in the development.
