

9 Candidates Vie in State Senate Primary

Dunkel Junior High Has 197 on Second Honor Roll

Voters in the City and Township of Farmington will go to the polls next Monday, February 15, and cast ballots in the special election to fill the vacancy in the State Senate District. Those candidates nominated in Monday's special primary election will vie for the seat in the final election on April 5.

The 14th State Senate District has never been changed. Senator-Elect Paul Chandler, who won election in 1962, last fall's General Election, died December 12. There are a total of nine candidates, six Republicans and three Democrats, seeking nomination from their respective parties in Monday's primary.

The eligible voters for Monday's primary will cast ballots for either one of six Republican candidates or one of the three Democratic candidates, according to their own party preference.

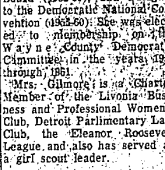
ELSIE GILMORE

GEORGE T. AMES

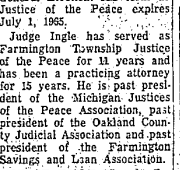
George T. Ames lives at 41088 Morningside in Novi. He has been married 18 years and has four children.

He served with the U.S. Army's Eighth and 78th Infantry Divisions during World War II and with the Secret Intelligence Branch of O.S.S. He is a member of the American Legion and the Veterans of Foreign Wars.

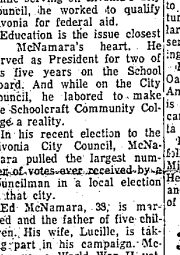

Robert S. Roberts is a two-term State Senator from Oakland County. Prior to being elected to the Senate, he was a State Representative. He was unsuccessful in a bid for a seat on the new Court of Appeals last fall.

The 42-year-old attorney is a partner in the law firm of Dielerle and Roberts with offices at 2057 Orchard Lake Road in Pontiac. Roberts served as Chairman of the State Senate Judiciary Committee during the last legislative session in Lansing.

Roberts, and his wife, the former Phyllis E. Miller of Benton Harbor, have two sons, Mark and Bruce. Their home is at 2486 Loyal, West Bloomfield Township. He and his family are members of the Pine Hill Congregational Church in West Bloomfield Township.

3 New Subs Considered by Twp Zoning Bd

Preliminary approval was given by the Township Zoning Board, January 28, on a plan for Franklyn Ravine, a subdivision of 51 single family homes planned to be located on the east side of Middlebelt Road north of Ten Mile Road.

The subdivision, proposed by Sheldon Rose, will be located on a 20 acre site known as the Spaller property between Middlebelt and East Junior High Schools. The board gave preliminary approval to the plan subject to the walking easement which was required by the Farmington School Board when the plan was presented for their consideration.

RECEIVED and presented but basically approved, was a plan for Colony Park Subdivision, a development of 182 single family homes proposed on a 20 acre site at the southwest corner of Thirteenth Mile and Farmington roads. Proponent, Mackey, Inc., will submit a revised plan at a later date.

A plan for a 175 acre development south of Fourteen Mile Road between Drake and Farmington roads, rejected by the board on December 1, was revised and re-submitted at the January 28 meeting and was again rejected.

The plan as submitted did not meet planned unit development requirements according to planning consultant, Charles Lehigh, and the subdivision which had been planned for commercial development could not be accepted. The terrain of this property presents problems to the developer, but the board felt that a satisfactory plan could be worked out. Les Taubman, proponent, was asked to rework the plan and re-submit it for further study.
