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McDonald's Game - Ending Tip-In Gives NFHS Win Over Oak Park By Walled Lake, 69-54

North Farmington gained its fifth league victory in seven games on a tip-in basket in the final seconds by senior John McDonald that provided a 51-50 edge over Oak Park.

North Farmington has now handed Oak Park its only two setbacks thus far in league play, the first coming in a 71-57 trouncing earlier this year.

THE RAIDER VICTORY deadlocked North Farmington and Oak Park in second place, with last record being one game behind league pacesetter, Birmingham Groves.

Although North Farmington earlier set a school scoring record of 77 points in coasting to a 21 point victory, the second meeting was undecided until the final shot of the game by McDonald.

The North Farmington squad opened up a quick lead in the first quarter and held a six point margin after the first eight minutes of play, leading 14-8.

After the scoring in the second quarter as they outscored the Raiders, 14-8, and tied the score at halftime, 22-22. Fred Bradley paced the Oak Park team as he hit 10 of his 11 points in the first half.

RICH SCHULTZ picked up nine of his 21 points as North Farmington pushed ahead to a 38-35 margin after three quarters of play.

In the fourth quarter the lead changed hands several times and Oak Park pushed ahead, 50-40, with less than a minute to play. The Raiders moved in for the final shot of the game, but it was off target and bounced off the backboard.

With only three seconds remaining to play, McDonald's consistently fine rebounding paid off as he jumped above the outstretching hands of the Oak Park players to tip in the game-winning basket.

Rich Schultz was again high for the night as he hit on seven of 10 shots and seven free throws, to pace NF with 21 points. McDonald jumped in nine points and Rick Lorenz added six. Len Cushingberry was high for the losers with 20 points.

Schultz is still one of the top point producers in the Northwest Suburban League, currently averaging 18.7 points per game. Rick Lorenz is right behind with an average of 17.7 points per game.

The most amazing thing about the Raiders is that after winning only one of their first three contests, they have come on to win seven of their last eight games and are currently riding on a five game winning streak.

NORTH FARMINGTON now recorded a first, second, third, and a fourth to score high individually in all-around.

George Hunzicker recorded 31 points in Free Exercise, Tumbling and the Trampoline. Hunzicker was State Champion in Lean, Randy Hernandez, Dave Shuter, and Wayne Huber are all presently missing from action. Injuries are beginning to jinx the gymnasts as they did last year during the season.

The Raiders' only first place was picked up by Skip Kirk on the Still Rings as the Pioneers carried first places in the other seven events.

finds itself a game out of first place with only two weeks of league play remaining. If a miracle should occur, and Oak Park was to lose another game, while at the same time Birmingham Groves was to lose another game aside from losing their final encounter with NF in two weeks, the Raiders could be the sole champions of the Northwest Suburban League.

However, this is unlikely and as things shape up, it looks as if there will either be a three way tie for first place between NF, Oak Park, and Groves, or Groves will finish alone.

To obtain this, North Farmington must defeat Groves in the Birmingham gym. Groves won the first meeting between the two schools, overcoming a six point deficit to down the Raiders, 66-61, and can coast to the championship with a victory over the Raiders again.

COACH DICK WILSON's high-flying Raiders will meet Franklin Friday night in the North Farmington gym. Meanwhile, they can only hope for help from someone else in the league.

A short Viking rally was stymied in the second period when the Blue and White quintet switched into a zone press. The pressing defense held the visitors in check and Farmington left the court at halftime with a 36-32 advantage.

The third quarter was filled with mistakes on the part of both teams, but the Falcons still managed to outscore Walled Lake and led going into the fourth quarter.

Then, as has happened many times this year, the roof fell during the final eight minutes. Farmington's whole game, offensive and defensive, faltered when it had the lead going down to the wire. Walled Lake came storming back and outscored the Birds, 23-8, to record a row for Riddle Roy Jim Dragon, who surprised every body last week by pinning his Thurston adversary. Was the one who was surprised this week, losing one to "Bennie the Bear." This gave the Patriots an early six to zero lead.

Bernie Thompson was the first "Brown and Gold" wrestler to receive some points for the team as he had an easy 11 to two decision. Danny Vartanian, wrestling in a 27 and 150 pound weight class, pinned his foe in 1:14 seconds. This was Dan's first pin in his wrestling career. Now if he would only make weight, 112 pounds, we might see a few more of those live-points.

Greg Rayman won his match with a six and three decision. Lance Oak and Terry Geha both lost their matches for the second week in a row. Oak, the youngest wrestler on the team, is the only consistent loser on the squad. But he's still young and give him about three more years and he should be a fair wrestler. Geha did show a little aggressiveness as he did have the fastest pin of the night. Unfortunately the referee missed seeing it as he was waving the Franklin man some more points. It was a tough break but you can't have everything. It is too bad though that N.F. doesn't have anything in the 150 pound weight division. Franklin was ahead 12 to 11 at this point.

At 145 pounds Ray Roberts won by a pin in 2:37. Terry Sharbach was involved in what was one of the best matches of the night. His opponent wasn't much of a wrestler but he did Terry without much trouble at 1:37 of the last period. This match should go down in wrestling lore as it was the first time in the history of wrestling that a wrestler has called a time out in the middle of a match. It seems that the Franklin man's shoe had come off.

Dick Allen, Craig Wycinsky and Mike Coles took the last three matches in the upper weight classes. Allen and Coles won on pins.

Grimala Leads Falcon JV Five To WL Victory

The sophs captured a come-from-behind victory over Walled Lake last week to even their record at 5-5. Little Ed Grimala trailed the Vikings throughout the entire game, but a last minute burst for Farmington, led by Al Kuka, won the game in regulation play. George Grimala led the Little Falcons in scoring as he tallied for 21 points.

In the 122 pound weight class, Farmington's Dan Heuer waged a real battle with his Walled Lake Opponent, Findy. The match was finally determined by riding time, giving Findy a 2-2 decision.

FHS's TOM HUGHES and Bruce Patterson were both defeated by their Viking opponents, 7-4 and 3-1 respectively.

At 145 pounds, Tom Ugrin was defeated by Olin in a very close match that also was determined by riding time. Ugrin received an extra point after the match was over because he had amassed one minute more in riding time.

FARMINGTON'S Dick Johnson remained undefeated for the season as he defeated Hoxie of Walled Lake 4-0.

Tom Dittman, one of Farmington's promising sophomores, displayed one of his strongest performances of the year as he gained a 4-4 draw with his 162 pound opponent.

Don Kuffel, at 180 pounds, made quick work of his Walled Lake opponent as he pinned Rickard in 55 seconds.

Farmington heavyweight Dan Klawender was pinned in the second period of his match, making the final score 34-13.

This week the Falcons journey to Port Huron for a meet beginning at 7:30.
