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Give Qualified OK to Widening Farmington Rd.

An official request from the Farmington City Council asking the Oakland County Road Commission to proceed with widening Farmington Road from two lanes to four in 1965, was made at the City Council at its regular meeting February 1.

It had been brought to the attention of councilmen earlier that Wayne County was planning to widen Farmington Road from two lanes to four in 1965 resulting in a serious traffic bottleneck at Eight Mile, the dividing line between Wayne and Oakland counties.

City officials were informed by Oakland County that county funds would not be available to participate in widening the mile long stretch in 1965 but could likely be scheduled in early 1966.

Since this is a county controlled road, 75 per cent of the cost would have to be borne by the county and the remaining 25 per cent by the city.

County road commission officials' initial estimate was that it would cost approximately \$204,000 to add two more lanes and re-surface the two existing lanes and approximately \$25,000 more if the two present lanes were removed and four new lanes laid the mile long distance.

When the matter came up earlier, councilmen asked City Manager John Dinan to check with the city's bonding attorney to determine whether city bonds could be sold to finance the city's share of the cost for this major road improvement. His report Monday night was that bonding up to \$60,000 would be permitted, according to the bonding attorney.

While the councilmen unanimously approved going ahead in requesting detailed engineering and cost study work it was made clear that they did not want to be firmly committed to the project until it is determined with more certainty what the total cost will be.
