

Kendallarks Set For Music Festival

The Kendallarks with their director, Mr. George Assemany, bring talents together March 27 at North Farmington High School where they will be one of several groups participating in the "Festival of Music." This is the first planned annual program of its kind and is presented by the Kiwanis Club of Kendallwood in cooperation with the Kendallarks and several church and instrumental groups from Farmington area schools.

THE KENDALLARKS. The twenty-five Farmington Mothers and housewives, came into existence with enthusiasm members from the Kendallwood Newsomers, interested groups. They first met in the fall of 1957. When a large number of women responded to the call for membership in a women's chorus group and discovered they blended well in three-part harmony, they decided to organize under a specific name and engage a professional director. Later, when membership was extended to all parts of Farmington, the name Kendallarks was chosen which denotes the locale from which the chorus originated.

The Kendallarks were fortunate in obtaining as their first director, Mr. Eddy Elgendorf, Musical Director of O. E. Dunkel Junior High. They are now under the direction of Mr. George Assemany who joined the group in September, 1963.

MR. ASSEMANNY received his training at Wayne State University, at the Palaeo Institute and Detroit Institute of Musical Arts. He previously directed the Carillon Chorus, a mixed group originating in Detroit. For two years Mr. Assemany directed a male chorus which broadcast a weekly program from Denver, Colorado for the United States Army. For the last ten years he has been organist and choir director of Christ the King Catholic Church. He is also director of the University of Detroit High School Glee Club; and in addition, teaches private piano and organ.

Kennedy Memorial Bookshelf," declared a resolution introduced by Martin Gluckstein.
