The property is part of a recorded plat and located in the SE1/4 of Section 36, T1N, R9E, Farmington Township, Oakland County, Michigan. It is generally known as the Boford Inn Company property having a postal address of 28000 Grand River Ave., Farmington, Michigan and is between Oxford Street and Colwell Street, north of Grand River. One of these B-3 requests fronts on Colwell St. and includes the present coach house, a pool and garden area and part of the inn building. The other B-3 request fronts on Colwell St. and includes five present motel units. The adjoining presently commercial zoning mentioned is the present 200 foot depth along Grand River Ave. that street has commercial zoning.





The Sorrows team now goes on to the regionals and hopes to bring home another trophy.


**Pvt. Tom Bliss Ends Clerical Course**
