

Letter Written Home By Wounded Soldier
Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Higgins, Sr. of 2813 Forestbrook Drive in Farmington received a letter from their son, SSG Clifford H. Higgins, Jr. who was wounded in South Viet Nam on February 7 while serving with the U.S. Army Advisory team.
The wounded soldier's letter was written six days after the Viet Cong guerrillas' raid on Pleiku, South Viet Nam from the Eighth Army Field Hospital in Nha Trang, South Viet Nam, where he is recovering from shrapnel injuries to the arms and legs.
His parents received the letter on Thursday, February 18, and disclosed their son writes he is recovering nicely. The soldier is a graduate of Detroit Country Day and attended Michigan State University prior to his three-year enlistment in the Army in March of 1962.
