pointed out that if this entire parcel was developed with homes in the \$25,000 price range an additional \$2 million dollars worth of housing would be added in the city. Children in kindergarten through sixth grade will be taught Modern Math in September of 1955.

To present the plans to the board, Jack Cleveland, Principal of Kenbrook School and a member of the arithmetic committee, stated that New Math doesn't mean the "throwing away" of "old" math. He said that the numbers are still the same, that 2 plus 2 still equals 4, and that only the method of teaching is changed.

"During general discussion prior to the appointments, Aldo Vagazzi and Martin Gluckstein (Democratic party leaders in the township) commented the township board for its action in appointing such a special citizens committee.

The name of Norman Peterson was suggested by Gluckstein as a possible member for this committee but his suggestion was not considered.

### Pass Meadowbrook Hills Bond Resolutions

Formal bonding resolutions for the sale of bonds to underwrite the cost of extending district water facilities into the Meadowbrook Hills subdivisions were approved by the Farmington Township Board at its regular meeting Monday night.

The official resolutions were drawn up by the township's bonding attorney. Public hearings on the extension of water school program would be open service on a special assessment basis to these subdivisions in the southwest corner of the township had been held earlier.

With the new method of teaching Math, Cleveland said, children's development, geometric ideas early, the principle of the equation is more easily understood, and children learn more efficiently. John Hessler, Principal of Highlandswood School and chairman of the arithmetic committee, emphasized that the evaluation of textbooks which was done on the basis of the teachability of the books, vocabulary, pictures and coloring, and not on the Modern Math method itself. He stated that the work of the committee has been directed toward a determination that classroom teachers will understand what they are teaching and feel a real enthusiasm for their subject.

A nine-member planning commission to replace the zoning board is planned as well as a special study committee on public safety.

Trustee Oppenheimer made it clear that he felt all the appointees were men and women of the highest integrity and that he would personally take exception to any charges that might come up or be made against them on sites selected for future fire stations or other township buildings. He expressed bitterness and regret over some of the conflict of interest charges that had been leveled in recent months against elected township officials and board or commission members.

District Library Board. He was president of the Farmington Meadows Association in 1952 and is still active in affairs of the subdivision association.

He employed the Michigan Bell Telephone Co. as a staff supervisor.

THE "FRS" SLATE states that it will be dedicated to a government representation of the people and will be running on the following seven-point platform:

1. VESTED INTERESTS: The numbers of the FRS Team have no vested interests in the City of Farmington other than their homes, and will consider their best interest in the community as a whole.
2. HOMEOWNERS' INTEREST: With a more equitable representation on the council, the interests of the homeowners in Farmington will be given greater consideration when ordinances and zoning changes are proposed.
3. CITY CHARTER: It is the intent of the FRS Team to establish a commission to review the adequacy of the present city charter in view of the current needs of the city. The present charter was adopted when the population of Farmington was less than 25 percent of its present size.
4. APARTMENTS: It is the feeling of the FRS Team that the city is sufficiently saturated with apartment buildings and that a serious consideration should be given to limiting the construction of dwellings of this nature.
5. PROPER ORDINANCE ENFORCEMENT: It is the intent of the FRS Team to demand strict enforcement of the city codes.
6. BUDGET AND TAXES: It is the intent of the FRS Team to take steps toward establishing a more equitable and efficient budget for the City of Farmington, while maintaining the present tax base through realistic planning of expenditures.
7. RECREATION: More and better recreational facilities are needed in the City of Farmington, and it is the intent of the FRS Team to provide these facilities through the systematic development of a city-wide recreational plan and program.

### Twp. to Handle FARC Request At Budget Time

The request of the Farmington Area Recreation Commission for a substantial increase in the amount that Farmington Township will be asked to contribute to help underwrite the cost of the summer recreation program was presented to board members at their regular meeting Monday night.

No official action was taken on the request but Supervisor Carl Hall, pointed out that board members were already cognizant of the fact that an increased amount would be asked for this year. The request will be handled at the time the budget for the coming fiscal year is prepared, he commented.

It was pointed out in the FARC meeting of request that it was necessary to ask the township for a larger contribution because of the fact that a substantial amount had been forthcoming from United Foundation and this year and that operating costs were on the rise because of greater participation each year.

The City Council has already approved an increase in its contribution to the FARC from \$1,200 to \$1,800 but has made it contingent upon the Township Board's approval of a proportionate increase in its contribution.

The United Fund contribution which a few years back underwrote most of the cost of the program has now dwindled to \$1,800 for 1955.
