The electronic systems of rockets are packaged in compact, plastic blocks, each little more than two inches square and containing some 140 components welded together by pure nickel wires.

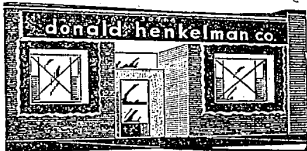

Republican Leaders Back Senator Roberts

Five area Republican leaders issued a statement this week declaring themselves "mutually related" at the entry of former State Senator Farrell Roberts of West Bloomfield in the race for the 14th District State Senate seat vacated by the recent death of Paul Chandler.

In part the group stated, "We are convinced that the citizens of the 14th District State Senate seat given the opportunity to elect someone of the same high caliber as Paul Chandler. We have discussed the announced candidacy of former State Senator Farrell Roberts and found ourselves mutually related to have a candidate of his background and qualifications in the race."

SIGNING the statement were practically all of the official Republican leaders having jurisdiction in the 14th District which includes Livonia, Plymouth and Northville from Wayne County and most of Western Oakland County. The declaration was signed by Charles Lyle, Oakland County GOP Chairman; Rep. Robert Waldron, Wayne County GOP Chairman; John Coleman, 19th Congressional District GOP Chairman; and Leonard Hippler and Mrs. Betty Jacobus, GOP leaders in the Livonia, Northville and Plymouth areas.

ROBERTS, WAS a two-term senator from the old Eighth District which was divided as a result of the recent re-apportionment of the legislature. In November he was an unsuccessful candidate for the new State Court of Appeals.

Chandler, who died suddenly of a heart attack on December 12, was described by the group as "truly an outstanding man and a dedicated public servant." A former state representative from the Livonia area and a prominent community newspaper publisher, Chandler was elected to the State Senate last November. His death leaves the district without representation until a special election is held in April.

THE GROUP WENT on to say "It is unfortunate that this must be an immediate concern so closely following Senator Chandler's death, but the election timetable provides for an early candidates' filing deadline of January 4, 1965 which severely limits our campaign activity."

"We are now in the process of planning a hard-driving, aggressive campaign to retain republican representation in this district and for thousands of other people throughout the state who have been disenfranchised by the Democratic gerrymandering of the state legislature."

State-Wide Representation From Students Attending NMU

Dramatic shift in area representation by the students attending at Northern Michigan University is reflected in the University's record enrollment figures for the 1964-65 academic year.

Comparison of enrollment figures the past eight years reveals Northern has evolved from a primarily Upper Peninsula institution to a university with state-wide representation.

Students attending Northern Michigan from Farmington are: David Busch, senior; Robert Crouse, junior; John Fleck, junior; Daniel Gerber, sophomore; Marjorie Johnson, sophomore; Daniel Kuller, freshman; Raymond Norton, sophomore; Richard Nyer, freshman; Dennis Porter, freshman; Paul Riggo, freshman; Robert Salay, junior; and Naylor Zimmerman, freshman.

In 1956, 92 percent of the students came from Upper Peninsula communities, compared to 71 percent during the current year.

REPRESENTATION from Lower Peninsula counties has increased from less than 11 percent in 1956 to 22 percent in 1964-65. The remaining seven percent of Northern's total enrollment of 4,221 full-time students this year are from other states and foreign countries.

Enrollment this year from the Lower Peninsula counties alone was Wayne, Oakland and Macomb—totals "more than the entire NMU enrollment 10 years ago. The largest increase is from Wayne County, which this year is represented by 319 students, as compared to seven in 1956. The number of students attending Northern from Oakland County has increased from four in 1956 to 218 this year. Macomb County's representation has gone up from one student eight years ago to 87 during the current semester.

Seventy-one of Michigan's 83 counties are represented on the NMU campus this year, compared to 49 counties in 1956. Eight years ago, there were no students attending from Washburn and Genesee counties; today there are 40 students from Washburn County, and 25 from Genesee County.

Every one of Upper Peninsula's 15 counties has students and women at Northern. Marquette County leads with a total enrollment of 1,536, compared to 422 in 1956. Dickinson County ranks second with a total enrollment of 236 students, an increase of 162 over the past eight years. Iron County has 169 students at Northern, compared with 75 in 1956. Delta

County is a close fourth, with 168 students or more than double the number eight years ago. INCREASE in enrollment from the other 11 UP counties is indicated by the following figures: Alger, 30-108; Baraga, 21-61; Chippewa, 11-137; Gogebic, 42-138; Houghton, 58-133; Keweenaw, 1-7; Lake, 1-26; Mackinac, 3-32; Menominee, 9-119; Ontonagon, 16-83; Schoolcraft, 24-37.

Twenty-four other states, the District of Columbia, and eight foreign countries are represented on Northern's campus. The largest enrollment, next to Michigan, comes, not surprisingly, from the neighboring and more populous states. Wisconsin has 82 students at Northern, and Illinois and New York, 54 each.

The number of students from the other 21 states is as follows: Massachusetts, 19; Pennsylvania, 13; New Jersey, 12; Ohio, seven; Indiana, six; Florida and Virginia, four each.

Connecticut, three; California, Minnesota and Nebraska, two each; Arizona, Colorado, Delaware, Kansas, Kentucky, Maine, Maryland, Missouri, Tennessee, and the District of Columbia, one each.
