By nature he is more likely to overpromise than to underpromise. Also, he is deeply sincere in his desire to accelerate the economic growth of this country and to wipe out poverty.

But we must not forget that both Woodrow Wilson and Franklin Roosevelt promised to keep America out of "foreign" wars. And already the British financial crisis has forced the Federal Reserve to raise its discount rate to 4 per cent. Despite President Johnson's dislike of higher money rates.

THEREFORE, AS WE look forward to 1965 from our vantage point of 60 years of experience in forecasting and analysis, we emphasize once again that the great rolling tides of economic growth and social progress are likely to have greater impact on what is to unfold, than will the campaign promises of successful candidates.

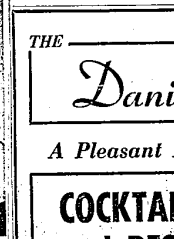

Information on expenditures for residential alterations and repairs will be collected from a number of area families early in January. The survey will be conducted locally and in 150 other sample areas of the country.

Items to be covered in the survey include painting, plumbing, roofing, flooring, and other related repair and replacement projects. Repair and replacement of heating and air conditioning systems will be covered also. Previous surveys of this type indicate that Americans spend between 11 and 12 billion dollars annually for the upkeep and improvement of their homes.
