FHS Writers In Competition

The Annual Scholastic Writing Competition for 1965 will include a fair share of FHS entries. From the Journalism Department comes six contributions: an editorial, news story, interview, and sports story, with one entry each, and two feature stories.

The English entries come from three sources — the English classes of Mrs. Karen Forrester, Mr. Lee S. Peel, and Mr. Raymond Sherpiss. These entries show a leaning toward short and short short stories with 10 entries in these two classes. For the poetry and light verse divisions come nine entries. Last in student interest is the formal essay, claiming only two entries.

Having over 35 per cent of the entries score in last year's competition, student and teacher optimism for this year is evident.

Mr. Peel, on the basis of the entries from his English and Journalism classes, predicts that about 25 per cent will gain recognition of some kind or another this year. He goes so far as to state that Dick Moore, 1964 graduate of FHS, will receive an Achievement Key for his collection of "Eight Poems."

This year's entries total 27, an increase of four over last year.
