

Author of Best Seller to Speak at FEA Meet

The Farmington Education Association, through its President, Mrs. J. R. Lewis, invited all interested persons in the Farmington area to attend the Association's next regularly scheduled general meeting. The meeting will be held at Farmington High School on Monday, January 25, at 3:30 p.m.

The speaker for this meeting will be Robert C. W. Ettinger, author of the best-seller, "The Prospect of Immortality." Mr. Ettinger, in his book, considers the possibility of freezing new-born children, and the hope that the children of the future will be able to revive, repair, and rejuvenate such persons so that they may enjoy a glorious life.

Mr. Ettinger, vice president of the FEA, will present Mr. Ettinger, who also made this book, by Lloyd Smith, chairman of communications for the FEA, of the weekly series of radio programs, entitled, "Teachers' Report Card." The program is conducted weekly over station WJR on Saturdays at 7:30 p.m. It also runs on station WJLM on Saturdays at 11:15 a.m., and over WEXL at 9:30 p.m. on Sundays.

The programs serve all of us, Smith stated, by answering each week some of the questions citizens ask about our schools. A different teacher appears on the program each week.

Art Institute Tour Enjoyed

A visit to the Detroit Institute of Art was enjoyed by members of Suburban chapter of Beta B'nai B'rith and their guests on January 5.

Transportation to and from Farmington was provided by chartered bus. Lunch was served in the Riviera Court, was followed by a guided tour of the highlights of the museum's collection from early Roman art to contemporary American painting.

Dodd Bill On Senate Floor

When the new Congress came in last week, one of the first bills on the floor of the Senate was a fire arms control measure introduced by Senator Thomas Dodd (D., Conn.).

Although 18 bills dealing with the sale of fire arms weapons were submitted last year by Sen. Dodd and others, no new legislation on weapon sales was passed. Dodd attributes these failures to the lobbying activities of strong pressure groups, such as the National Rifle Association (NRA). The NRA has opposed federal supervision of fire arm sales, through the mail or otherwise, on the basis of the Second Amendment.

Dodd's bill this session is, in effect, a re-introduction of a bill submitted after the assassination of President Kennedy. It was "watered down" considerably, and finally rejected in final form, the bill imposed no government controls on store sales of guns, but only mail order sales. A buyer of a gun by mail order had to have been required to prove that he was over 18 years old, and would also have had to submit his criminal record. The mail order house would have been required to turn this record over to the buyer's local police before sending him any weapon.

Sen. Dodd believes that by exposing the lobbyists working against his bill he can get passage this session. His measure would lack the priority of Great Society bills of the Administration.

VOLUNTEERS WILL be trained in a series of four classes of two hours each starting next week in Botsford General Hospital and continuing within a two week period. The training course, under the direction of Mrs. Spruill will consist of classroom instruction by the Red Cross and new Botsford General Hospital staff. Their training with interesting assignments at nursing stations, at information and admitting desks, in the pediatric playroom or adding to the comfort and welfare of patients elsewhere in the hospital.

At the end of this period of supervised training they will receive their certificates and be capped as members of the extensive national Gray Lady Service of the American Red Cross to continue their volunteer services during hours of their own choosing as long as they wish.

Brian Dates of FHS Chooses West Point

Brian Dates, a senior at FHS and vice-president of the Student Council, was recently informed that he had been chosen as an alternate for West Point Academy from the Eighteenth Congressional District. After taking a series of civil service exams in October, he was notified in mid-December that he had been chosen as one of the four alternates for the appointment.

Although he is an alternate, he still has two chances of becoming a cadet. Dates' first chance would come if the appointment is for some reason discontinued. The second is a little more promising: On March 3-6, Dates will go to Selridge Air Force Base, where he will take a second series of tests. These tests will determine who is to be selected from the alternates to compose 400 "at-large" cadets, who, along with the cadets from each district, will complete the freshman class of 1966. He plans to enter the engineering corps on graduating from West Point.

Asked if he had expected to be chosen he replied, "Those tests were really hard, so it was sort of a surprise when I learned I had been chosen as an alternate."
