## Wood Creek Farms Village

Maury Tieghem's uncle, Fa-  
ther Lucian Tieghem, arrived  
here in Wood Creek on his 70th  
birthday having narrowly es-  
caped death in the Congo after  
40 years of missionary service  
there. Many of you remember  
that he was here in the sum-  
mer of 1922 when he was  
returned to his duties in  
Drodro. It has certainly  
brought the Congo, and new  
African nation situations, into  
sharp focus.

As Father Tieghem speaks  
French and Flemish but little  
English much of this taken  
from a translation by two  
Friends of Our Lady of So-  
rows.

"IN LESS than two months  
the elderly clergyman—1) was  
captured and held hostage at  
his mission at Drodro, a town  
of about 40,000 near Lake Al-  
bert in the eastern Congo; 2)

managed to slip away from  
the rebels and find refuge in a  
neighboring village; 3) saw  
Congolese natives who befriend-  
ed him slain with spears by  
vengeance-seeking rebels; 4)

was recruited by the rebels  
with rifle bullets, and kept prisoner  
for several weeks in the mis-  
sion cellar with about 70 other  
white and Negro hostages.

"BROTHER TIEGHEM kept  
a diary of his experiences. An  
entry for Oct. 30 described how  
a small rebel force—including  
two of his children—drove  
up in front of the Drodro mis-  
sion. "We greeted them, Broth-  
er Tieghem noted, but realized  
that now it's serious. About  
30 boisterous young people soon  
arrived on a truck and seized  
four bottles of sacramental  
wine. Brother Tieghem and six  
other whites, including three  
nuns, were then imprisoned in  
the mission and guarded by  
four lance-bearing boys, 15 to  
18 years old. One of the Broth-  
er Tieghem and the others es-  
caped to a nearby village where  
natives gave them refuge."

The whites were recaptured  
the next day. Brother Tieghem  
turned his head away as sev-  
eral of the friendly Congolese  
were slain. He also explained  
that the white hostages to be  
killed were first taken to Stan-  
leyville where they could be  
executed near a monument to  
the late Belgian King, King  
Congo's first premier. But they  
were returned to Drodro where  
about 100 rebels awaited them  
and the besting took place.

Brain saved them because the  
rebels fled into the bush be-  
lieving they would lose their  
self-imagined "magic powers"  
if they killed the whites. Broth-  
er Tieghem and his family were  
rescued by white mercenaries.

Brother Tieghem is spending  
much of his time writing let-  
ters to other missionaries who  
escaped from the Congo in the  
hope of getting some trace of  
more than 200 still not heard  
from. He knows many have  
been killed but hopes many others  
will reach safety. He did not  
escape by a thread but by a  
raindrop.

This certainly brings into  
focus also the confusion in the  
United Nations. "What needs to  
be guarded against from now  
on is admittance to the U.N. of  
regimes proclaimed by heads-  
men who set themselves up in  
some bush-town 'capital,' de-  
sign a flag and declare that a  
new nation has been born. Some  
of the General Assembly mem-  
bers already on hand come  
uncomfortably close to that  
description," he said.
