Month of January Special "CURLS" For Little Girls

What to do about "Tols 'n' Teens" who have soft, limp hair and want a foundation for the near straight look.

At Jean's we know what to do! Naturally the number one consideration would be whether the young lady's hair is too soft and limp or too sparse to wear it near straight. If it is not, then we proceed as follows: We select the proper lotion—one made especially for soft, limp hair. We use rods which give more width to the wave pattern, but wrap small amounts of hair on each rod. We want body to support the style.

The large, oval rods are used for the natural curl look. These rods eliminate the problem of getting more curl on the ends with less curl near the scalp. The large waves with oval rods are uniform from scalp to ends and the permanent wave can be dressed to be near straight with larger rollers and pin curls or more curly if a change in style is desired. The secret here is loads of movement in the hair but large wave patterns all the way to the ends.

MEMO: The judging of a good Perm is not how curly it looks when wet, but how well it controls and holds the hair style.
