NF Class Averages In English Viewed

The counselors have visited the University of Michigan, Eastern Michigan University, and Western Michigan University for the purpose of interviewing freshmen from North Farmington.

Looking over the averages it can be noted that especially weak grades are being received in English with not one A. Of eighteen freshmen interviewed who were in 9.0 or better average in high school, five got B's, 12-C's, and 1-D in English.

These general statements were made by 32 students who were interviewed.

1. Most important to establish good study habits.
2. Need more grammar and writing background.
3. High school students should learn to read on their own.
4. Speech classes were very helpful.
5. English 5 was a great help in freshman English.
6. A great deal of writing to do with proofs more interested in content than construction.
7. North Farmington provided good background in comparison with dorm-mates from other schools.
8. More conversation in high school language needed.
9. Have to learn to budget time and develop self-discipline.
10. Many hours of work and study outside the classroom.
