Shakespeare Program Set for Thurs. Night

The Farmington Players will present "An Evening With Shakespeare" Thursday night, Jan. 14, at the Farmington Junior High Gymnasium at 8 p.m. The program is sponsored by the Friends of the Library as part of the Clinton Wilbur Lecture Series.

The program will be in two parts: "Shakespeare at Random," created by Robert Thomas, will show some of Shakespeare's heroes and villains, taken from "Henry IV," "Taming of the Shrew," "Troilus and Cressida," "Hamlet," "Othello," "Merchant of Venice," "Olebeth," and "Merry Wives of Windsor." The cast includes Don Craig, Ted Budgen, Martin, Caroline Stetson, and Merle Pedicini. Elizabethan tunes from actual Shakespearean plays will be played by Jerry Eddy as part of this phase.

"When Shakespeare's Ladies Meet," by Charles George, will highlight the second part of the program. This one-act comedy has been revived by the Play-ers to add a touch of humor to the evening's performance. Among the ladies will be Patricia, Katherine, Ophelia, Des-

demons, Juliet, and Cleopatra. The cast will include Hope Nahstoll, Pearl Briggs, Alberta Mullin, Joyce Fisk, Lorraine Higgins, and Mary Ann Perry. Music during the brief intermission will feature some contemporary Elizabethan compositions by Correll and will be played by Jerry Eddy, and Pat and Bill Thornton. Plans for the Shakespeare program were organized by Kathryn Kormeser.

A short business meeting of the Farmington Friends will be held before the program. At that time Robert Schaefer, president of the Friends, will review the activities of the past year and will discuss plans for enlarging and improving library facilities for the Farmington area.

Don Nichols, vice-president of the Friends, commented, "The Farmington Players have created a program that should stimulate great enthusiasm for Shakespeare. A combination of the comedy and tragedy in a modern theater setting will be accentuated by sound effects and stage properties that will make Shakespeare's personalities come to life.
