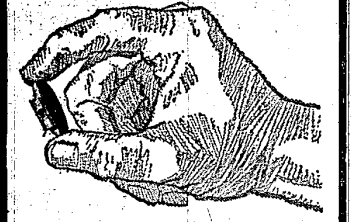

(Continued from Page 1-A) The request for the apartment development was not spelled out in the petition as required. The wording didn't spell out either what the rezoning was or which is sought to be reviewed nor does it indicate that the petitions are being circulated to approve or reject action taken by the Township Board, the opinion read.

The third point that the attorney made in his recommendation for rejection was that the signers should not only have given their name, address and date of signing the petition but also a description of the property they own.

It was his feeling that on petitions of this kind the same procedure as for special assessment districts was needed. Descriptions of the property owned are supposed to be given on all special assessment district petitions, according to Attorney Brennan.

"Their (Democrats) petitioning for a referendum vote on recent issues of the Township Board has been falsely represented in some cases and will result in undue expense to the taxpayers," Nolan said. He labeled Democratic tactics as "sour grapes."

On the controversial pay raise approved by the Township Board for the Township's three top administrators, Nolan stated the issue was made a political football. He charged Democrats were appraised in advance of the Board's action and deliberately stayed away from the meeting to provide themselves with ammunition to blast the administration, claiming the Board acted "high-handedly."

Twp. Citizens Air Concerns Over Tax Hikes

Major discussion during a rather lengthy question and answer period at the regular Farmington Township Board meeting Monday night centered around increased tax rates which homeowners received this year.

A citizen from Westbrook Subdivision stated that his taxes had gone up over \$100 over last year and he couldn't understand why. Mrs. Bernard By of Wood Creek Farms, Village, who regularly attends township meetings and is critical of actions taken, also raised several questions regarding tax rates.

They along with a couple of other citizens expressed a lack of understanding regarding tax rates and the effects that state equalization factors have on them.

Township Board members explained to them that all of the increases had been voted by the people and that clear explanations had been given in the Farmington Enterprise and through brochures put out what increases in taxes would result. Voters were told what dollar increases in taxes could be expected if voted increases for sewer operations, better police and fire protection, extension of sewer and water facilities to the industrial area and the establishment of a county community college district were approved.

Tom Nolan of Forest Park Subdivision stated that the homeowners of his subdivision were fully aware of what increases could be expected since their association had a representative at all meetings.

George Duke, Nolan and members of the Township Board all stated that they were coming up to be voted on that would result in tax increases.

Building Activity in 1964

(Continued from Page 1-A) to six special permits issued permits valued at \$1,053,877, the previous year valued at \$968,609. The City recorded its best year in new home construction back in 1951 when a total of 561 residential building permits were issued.

A total of 183 building permits were issued by the City in 1964, valued at \$2,314,478. In 1963 the City issued a total of 162 permits, valued at \$3,141,287.

THE BREAKDOWN on building activity statistics for the City in other than residential construction showed some interesting. Home additions were up from a total of \$6 in 1963 to \$1 last year. Valuations on the home additions were \$36,114 last year and \$28,031 in 1963.

B of E Hears Building Report

A report on building activities in the school district was presented to the Board of Education on January 11. The Service and Maintenance building, three weeks behind schedule, will be ready for occupancy on Monday, January 18, according to Julian Wilson and Sons, contractors.

The footings are now going in at the Bond School addition and the sewer is ready. A tentative schedule calls for completion of the main portion before school is out in June.

The interior and exterior masonry walls are nearing completion at the East Junior High School addition, and about half of the concrete has been poured for the first floor slab.

The structural steel work at the North Farmington High School addition is about 90 per cent completed, and masonry walls have been started. The concrete and block foundations are approximately 50 per cent completed at the new Larkshire School, and the sand has been completed in the building area.

In five separate motions, expenditures for equipment were approved for Bond, North Farmington High, and Larkshire schools and the service and maintenance building. The expenditures totaled \$25,785.

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
