Ottawa Dist. Boy Scouts Plan Polar Bear Derby

Boy Scouts of the Ottawa District are building new Klondike sleds or refurbishing their old ones and polishing up their scouting skills in readiness for the Polar Bear Derby to be held Saturday, Jan. 16, from 1:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the Kensington Park Group Campsite, Milford.

The Polar Bear Derby is a rugged winter scouting event which calls for teamwork and scout know-how, according to John Watke, Farmington, scouting and activities chairman for the district, who is in charge of the event.

PATROLS of five to eight Scouts will pull Klondike type sleds over a previously laid out trail stopping enroute at designated spots to participate in events which test their scouting ability.

Stations will be named after Yukon towns and will present

the following problems to each patrol: Dawson: first aid, ice rescue and bandaging broken or sprained limb; Yukon Peak: rope work and essential knots; Kodiak: measuring distance or height; Skagway: compass work; Fairbanks: goldrush race, an efficiency test of sleds in a downhill run for speed and durability.

AT POLAR COVE, the Scouts will build a fire and heat chocolate to test skill and speed at firebuilding. The "North Pole" will be Derby headquarters and the Assayer's office.

Patrols will be awarded "gold nuggets" for points earned at each station and for such things as extra teamwork, Scout participation and Scout-like conduct, good turns and good sled design.

Patrol leaders will turn in the pole of earned nuggets at the assayer's office to qualify for awards. Biggest poke will earn the Polar Bear Trophy. There will also be trophies for second and third place winners and a streamer for each participating patrol.

Troops wishing to camp for each winter weekend may call Watke for the assignment to sites not being used for the Derby.

AAUW Speaker Slated Jan. 20

The Farmington Branch of the American Association of University Women (AAUW) will welcome the public to its general meeting Wednesday, January 20, 8 p.m., in the cafeteria of the East Farmington Junior High School, 25500 Middlebelt. William P. Malm, Associate Professor of Music Literature at the University of Michigan, will speak on "Japanese Music." Professor Malm has written widely for general publications in the field of Japanese music. He is the author of two books, "Japanese Music and Musical Instruments," 1959, and "Nagauta: The Heart of Kabuki Music," 1962.

PROFESSOR MALM received the degree of Bachelor of Music in 1949, and Master of Music in 1950, both from Northwestern University. In 1959 he received a Doctor of Philosophy degree from the University of California, Los Angeles. From 1955 to 1957, Professor Malm was a Ford Foundation Fellow in Tokyo, Japan, returning again for the academic year 1963-64 on a grant from the American Council of Learned Societies and the University of Michigan.

Among other academic honors, Professor Malm has received the Monograph Prize in Humanities from the American Academy of Arts and Sciences in 1960. He is a member of Pi Kappa Lambda, American Musicology Society, Society for Ethnomusicology, and Association for Asian Studies.

MRS. DAVID MILLIS, Program Chairman, will introduce the speaker. After the program and refreshments, a business meeting for members will be conducted by Mrs. T. F. Lapin, President.

THE BLAZING INFERNO pictured above was a vacant house in Farmington Township near Grand River and Middlebelt Road which caught fire last Wednesday afternoon and was completely destroyed. Township firemen responded to the scene and kept the blaze confined to the old homestead but decided the building would be a hazard and an eyesore if left partially burned and so stood by and watched as the

flames leveled the small one-story frame structure. Firemen theorized the blaze was set off by vandals. Building Department Superintendent for the Township Al Cain said the home was not fit for habitation and considerable repairs would have been required before a family would have been allowed occupancy. The home had not been condemned, however.

Farmington Selected as Site Of Community College Branch

Farmington will be the home of one of Oakland Community College's three branches. The College and financial gifts to the college board is located at the intersection of the I-696 Expressway and Orchard Lake Road in Farmington Township.

The 135 acre parcel was obtained for \$471,332. New buildings will be constructed on this site, and should be ready for occupancy in the fall of 1968. The site of the first college branch was purchased in Auburn Heights last October. This 47,000 acre parcel located at the northeast corner of I-75 and I-590, just east of Pontiac.

The County Tuberculosis Sanatorium in Waterford Township was the second site obtained by the college board. The 84 acre site, located on Union Lake, was obtained for its appraisal value of \$227,000.

The buildings already located on these two sites will provide excellent college facilities which will open in the fall of 1968 after enrolling over 2,000 full time students is anticipated for the fall of 1965. Classes will apply toward a four-year, baccalaureate degree to be earned at another college, and two year associate degrees in technical areas.

Residents of the college district will pay a \$10 enrollment fee, \$10 for the next three credits, and \$7 a credit for the subsequent nine credits. Credits in excess of 12 will involve no additional fees. The maximum fee charge for a resident of the college district is \$103 a session.

Non-resident students living in Michigan, but outside the college district, will pay \$90 in tuition fees per semester. Out-of-state students will be charged \$320 in tuition fees.

Letters of accreditation from leading Michigan colleges and universities, indicating they will recognize credits earned at Oakland, have been received by the school.

Academic and career counseling to assist students in selecting a program are available before the fall session begins. All entering students will have pre-arranged counseling appointment.

A student satisfactorily completing transfer courses will be able to enter the senior college without the loss of credits. Technical courses designed for specific occupations cannot be transferred to senior colleges.

Since a full college program is designed to occupy 45 school hours a week, students planning to work at an outside job more than 15 hours a week.

Elementary Workshops Planned; Students Will Get Vacation

A Fine Arts and Physical Education Workshop has been scheduled by the Farmington School System. On Wednesday and Thursday, January 27 and 28, the elementary schools in Farmington will be dismissed at 11:00; and on Friday, January 29, there will be no schools in session. This brief vacation for the children will allow their teachers to take part in an inservice training program.

In-service training is a modern educational method used to keep teachers up to date on current developments in their fields. All teachers attend all sessions. The workshop this month will deal with physical education and with the fine arts, both of which are important parts of our children's everyday school life.

AT THE PHYSICAL Education workshop, which will be held at Cloverdale School, teachers will hear Dr. Richard C. Havard who is Division Director of Physical Education at Wayne State University. Later the Farmington Schools' own Physical Education Department will give demonstrations using some of the children. A symposium will conclude the program.

The Fine Arts Workshop at Wm. Grace School will open with a demonstration of instrumental music, featuring a stage band chosen by Lloyd Smith from music students in the Farmington Schools. The band will be followed by a woodwind quintet, also from the Farmington Schools.

SPEAKERS AT THIS work-

shop will be Miss Mabel Ne-moto of the Art Department of Michigan State University and Mr. Charles McDermid of the Music Department at Michigan State. Later two revolving sessions will involve all of the teachers as they attend a presentation by Music Clinician Miss Martha Waite from Michigan State University; and a presentation by the Farmington Schools' Art Department which will include film strips, slides, and an art exhibit.

To handle the growing number of teachers in the Farmington School System, the Early Elementary teachers will attend the Fine Arts Workshop on Wednesday while the Later Elementary teachers are attending the Physical Education Workshop. The schedules will be reversed on Thursday.

On Friday, all teachers will meet in sessions in their own buildings.

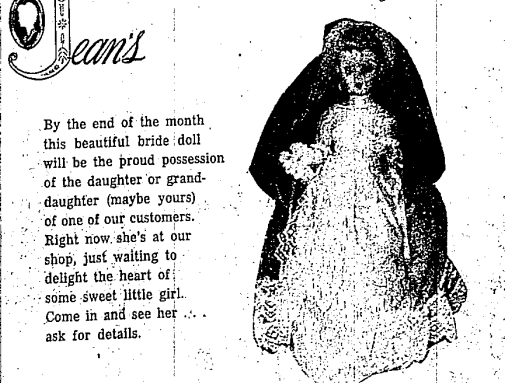
