

NOTICE OF SPECIAL ELECTION

CLARENCEVILLE SCHOOL DISTRICT OF OAKLAND AND WAYNE COUNTIES, MICHIGAN

TO THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF SAID SCHOOL DISTRICT:

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that a Special Election of the qualified electors of the aforesaid School District will be held in the Clarenceville School District of Oakland and Wayne Counties, Michigan, on Monday, March 29, 1965, and at such Special Election the following propositions will be submitted to the qualified electors of the School District:

PROPOSITION I: BONDING PROPOSITION

Shall CLARENCEVILLE SCHOOL DISTRICT OF OAKLAND AND WAYNE COUNTIES, MICHIGAN, borrow the sum of not to exceed THREE MILLION FIVE HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$3,500,000.00) and issue its bonds therefor, for the purpose of paying the costs of constructing a new auditorium at the Clarenceville High School and of erecting additions to existing school houses and of properly furnishing and equipping the same, of acquiring additions to school sites, of site development and improvement, and of building and equipping playgrounds?

MILLAGE INCREASE PROPOSITION

PROPOSITION II:

Shall the limitation on the total amount of taxes which may be imposed in any one year upon all property in CLARENCEVILLE SCHOOL DISTRICT OF OAKLAND AND WAYNE COUNTIES, MICHIGAN, be increased, as provided in Section 6, Article IX of the Constitution of Michigan, by four (4) per cent per dollar of assessed valuation, as finally equalized, for a period of five (5) years from 1965 to 1969, both inclusive, to be used for the purpose of paying general operating expenses of the school district?

The polls of election will be open from 7:00 A.M. to 8:00 P.M., Eastern Standard Time.

The places of voting shall be as follows:

PRECINCT 1:

Clarenceville Junior High School
20210 Middlebelt Road
Livonia, Michigan

PRECINCT 2:

Clarenceville Senior High School
20155 Middlebelt Road
Livonia, Michigan

Each person voting on the proposition of increasing millage must be a citizen of the United States, above the age of twenty-one (21) years, and have resided in the State of Michigan six (6) months, and in the School District thirty (30) days immediately preceding the election, and must be a registered elector of the School District. Each person voting on the proposition of borrowing money and issuing bonds, in addition to the above qualifications, must be the owner of property assessed for ad valorem taxes within the School District or the lawful husband or wife of such person.

Only persons registered voters are eligible to vote.

TAKE NOTICE that the Board of Education has estimated in connection with the above mentioned bond issue, that the costs of constructing a new auditorium at the Clarenceville High School and of erecting additions to existing school houses and of properly furnishing and equipping the same, of acquiring additions to school sites, of site development and improvement, of building and equipping playgrounds, along with the payment of capitalized interest and costs incident to the issuance of said new bonds, all of which it is necessary to borrow by means of said bond issue, will be THREE MILLION FIVE HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$3,500,000.00).

To Open Class In Nutrition

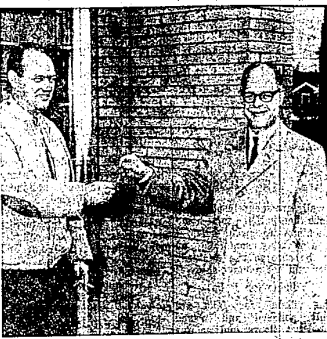
