Seek Record Turn-Out Mon.; Mar. 29 On Bonding and Millage Election

Considerable effort has been made and is continuing to be put forth to get every possible voter in the Clarenceville School District out to the polls next Monday, March 29, to vote on bonding millage proposals. The bonding and millage proposals are considered vital if the same type of educational program now being offered children in the Clarenceville schools is to be continued. The polls will be open from 7 a.m. until 8 p.m. Precinct one (1) and Precinct two (2) will be in the Senior High.

THE LARGEST POSSIBLE turn-out of voters is needed if school officials are to obtain a picture of the kind of school system residents of Clarenceville School District want for their children. The majority opinion to be expressed at the polls will indicate to the Board of Education the type of system it must endeavor to provide.

Construction of elementary junior and senior high school classrooms must be started as soon as possible. It will be difficult to assure anyone that the additions will be completed by September 1966.

The \$3,900,000 requested at this time is to provide for the total anticipated construction needs of the school district. If necessary, a minimum of 18 months from the time the voters approve a bond issue until

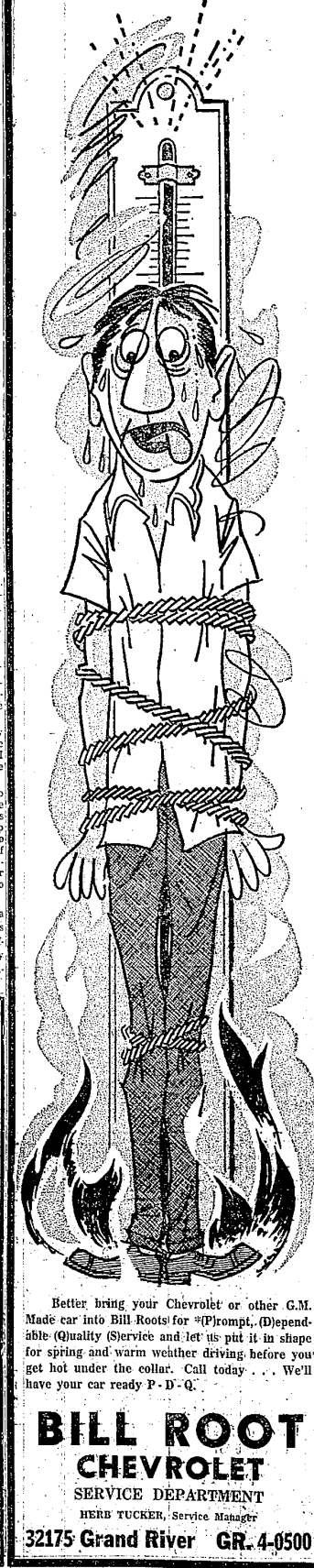

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Exchange Club Hears Mfg. Bank Economist

The Farmington Exchange Club on Wednesday last week heard a talk by Charles Walton, Mr. Walton, presently an Economist of the Manufacturers National Bank of Detroit, formerly served with the United States Department of Commerce and is an authority on money matters.

He explained the Federal monetary system including the guarantee of bank and Federal certificates and the operation of the Federal Reserve System in stabilizing the value of the dollar by pegging the price of gold. He also explained the balance of payments problem, its effects on the economy not only the United States, but also the countries of the free world.

Club members appreciated the talk with the question and answer period that followed.
