Play Proceeds Used Here For Scholarships

The proceeds from the play, "Jack and the Beanstalk" sponsored by the Farmington Area PTA Council, are to be used for a Scholarship Fund. The play will be presented at the Farmington Junior High School, April 3, at 10 a.m., 1 p.m. and 3 p.m.

The Scholarship Award amounts to \$300 per student, and is a joint effort of the Council and the local PTA to provide financial assistance to deserving students from Farmington area high schools. One or more scholarships, depending on the amount of funds available, are awarded each year. To date the following contributions have been received: Gill, \$75; Longacre, \$55; Kenbrook, \$25; and Beechview, \$50.

The students are selected by the Scholarship Committee and one counselor from each high school. To qualify for a scholarship the student must:

1. Graduate from one of the Farmington high schools between September 1 of the preceding year and August 31 of the year of the award.
2. Not have accepted in the award year another scholarship or equivalent financial aid other than an institutional tuition scholarship or educational grant for tuition.
3. Submit a letter of application by March 31 to the Chairman, Farmington PTA Council Scholarship Committee, 60 Farmington High School, Farmington, Michigan.
4. Tickets for the Play are being sold at the Elementary schools.

THE POLLS of said election will be open at 7 o'clock a.m. and will remain open until 8 o'clock p.m. of said day of election.

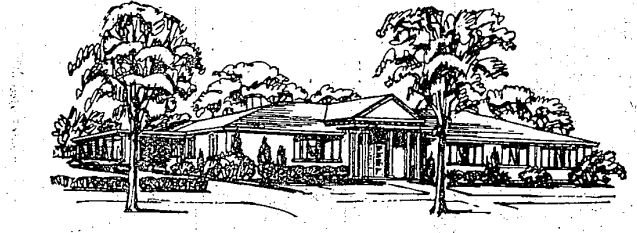
